SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY.

Astronomy has been declared to be a subject of intellectual pleasure rather than an economic one.

The number of men's linen collars made in this country every year is 4,000,000. About one collar to every eight men.

Barium sells for \$975 a pound, when it is sold at all, and calcium is worth \$1,800 a pound. Cerium is a shade higher—its cost is \$160 an ounce, or \$1,920 a pound.

One Dr. Tere, in England, is advocating the sting of bees as a remedy for rheumatism. He declares that he has treated with success 173 cases and has given in all 39,000 stings.

The process of manufacturing India ink has been a secret with the Chinese for many centuries, but a firm of English chemists claim to have discovered a process of treating camphor with sulphuric acid that produces a pigment identical with India ink.

There are, according to Rev. George Henslowe, more than 100 varieties of maize, which differ among themselves more than those of any other cereals. Some come to maturity in two months; others require seven. Some are as many feet high as others are inches. They vary similarly in shape and size of ears, color of the grain, and also in physical and chemical composition.

A new and effective method has been introduced for protecting dyers' vats against damp and fire. It consists in grinding oxide of zinc—not sulphate of zinc white—with glue water until it forms a stiff paint, and with this covering the wood, which latter must be quite dry. After it has dried two or three hours it is again painted with glue water, in which ten per cent. of its weight of chloride of zinc has been dissolved.

A recent writer says that those nations which are given to the cultivation of vocal music are strong and vigorous, with broad, expansive chests. Vocal music is a good lung exercise; it increases expansion of the lung tissue; it calls into action the entire lung, thus making the apices less likely to develop organic disease.—Virginia Medical Monthly.

A process of engraving on glass and crystal by electricity has been communicated to the French Academy of Sciences by M. Plante. The plate to be engraved is covered with a concentrated solution of nitrate of potash, and put in connection with one of the poles in the battery, and the design is traced out with a fine platinum point connected to the other pole. The results are said to be of marvelous delicacy.

Nitro-glycerine bids fair, say the doctors, to become an important remedy for diseases of the kidneys, and experiments are now making in cases of Bright's disease. Nitro-glycerine of a pure quality, possessing all the explosive powers of the substance, is prepared in alcohol (which removes the explosive quality) in the proportion of one part of the nitro-glycerine to ninety-nine of alcohol, and is then prepared with sugar or milk in tablets. Thus prepared it is called "Trinitrin." A patient in a Philadelphia hospital has had the dose increased until it reached eighty grains a day. He had Bright's disease, and the effects were said to be highly satisfactory.

TO STOP ELOPEMENTS.

A New York Editor Proposes a Very Unromantic and Prosaic Plan.

How to keep the girls at home may soon be a problem demanding solution in many households blessed with even a less number than eight of the dear creatures.

Some years ago a writer whose name, unfortunately, we can not recall, published a thoughtful article, fully illustrated, on that old and vexatious question of how to keep the boys on the farm. We do not now recall much of this able paper except the pictures, of which there were several. One of these represented the boy whom it was thought desirable to keep on the farm confined in a burglar proof room, with heavy bars on the windows, etc.

The author argued that there was nothing better to keep a boy away from the temptations and snares of city life than this. Another showed the boy with a stout chain passed around his body and the other end fastened to the stove. This was highly recommended for making boys feel attached to the farm. Still another represented the boy placed in easy reclining position, and a considerable pile of bricks heaped on his legs. The writer clearly demonstrated that there was nothing which had a greater tendency to make a boy cling to the old homestead.

We know not but this author may have written partly in a spirit of levity; certainly some of his plans are novel, and we never heard that any of them were ever put into actual use. We do not consider them practical, however beautiful they may be in theory, and if not adapted to the successful keeping of a boy on the farm how much less use would they or any thing of even a remotely similar nature be in restraining an impetuous young lady bent on flying with a young man to some accommodating and enterprising justice of the peace. The notorious failure of stone walls and iron bars to make either a prison or a cage was sung of long ago, and nowhere will their inadequacy be more noticeable than when they are employed in an attempt to restrain a girl from eloping when her heart is set on it.

The best and only sure way to prevent the elopement and frequently break off the match entirely, is, we believe, to watch carefully, and when the young man appears to carry off his romantic bride, whether he comes on a white palfrey and puts up a ladder to her window, as he should do, or only jumps off a street-car and meets her in a candy store—at this stage of the proceedings, we say, let the farmer put in an appearance and produce a minister, either from within the shadow of the porch or from the rear of the confectionery establishment and tarry a moment while the good man makes them one.

This will break up the elopement and in a great many instances prevent the marriage entirely, and the misguided young folks will frequently conclude they do not wish to be married as badly as they imagined. This plan pretty effectually kills off the romance. There is nothing romantic, we suppose, about standing up in the middle of a candy store and getting married, while the sales-ladies titter and chew gum and customers drop in and wink at one another. Let the fathers of the country try this plan on their eloping daughters and see if it is not successful.—N. Y. Tribune.

WOMEN IN BATTLE.

French Ladies Who Have Been Decorated with the Legion of Honor.

Truth is stranger than fiction, and when next you hear or read an impossible story, instead of exclaiming, like a well-known authoress to the narrator at a London dinner party, "Go it, Anatolia," you had better quietly observe, "I suppose it's true." Anyhow, we are apt to scout the stories of women who have concealed their sex the better to perform doughty deeds of valor, and lo! here are French statistics, with their dry facts, coming to prove that what novelists and poets have written has not been evolved from their inner consciousness, but from the romance of history. Thirty-four French women have been decorated with the Legion of Honor since the order was instituted, and of these seven distinguished themselves on the battle-field. Two women soldiers were decorated under the first empire, one having dressed as a man to replace her delicate brother, her sex only being discovered when she was wounded, after attaining the rank of sergeant. The second heroine took to fighting because she liked it, and distinguished herself at Yemmaper, Austerlitz and Jena. Saved for one brave vivandiere, she was a blank from 1815 to 1851, and then came more military women, whose exploits would read like an after-dinner story. Whether these women were or were not unsexed by thus abandoning their proper sphere is not the point at all; the fact remains that women have military qualities capable of efficient training should need arise; and in a country where the perils of war, the lack of an army and the volunteer question are being debated, it is just as well to recognize the fact that if National questions are at stake it becomes perfectly possible to double the volunteers of the army by inculcating both sexes.—Sydney (N. S. W.) Times.
