Council Proceedings.

Last Saturday evening the city council met in regular session. Present, councilmen E. W. Davis, J. S. Elliott, J. M. Carroll and A. K. Jones; recorder, J. E. Tuttle and marshal, M. Heritage.

An ordinance prohibiting the riding of bicycles upon the sidewalks of the city of Union, Union county, Oregon, and fixing a penalty for violating the same.

Section IV. Inasmuch as bicycle riding upon the sidewalks is becoming a public nuisance in the city of Union, this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor, and proper publication.
