The County court of Union county, Oregon, will receive sealed proposals at the county clerk's office in Union, up to 1 o'clock p. m. on July 23, 1889, for the construction of two solid stone piers for a bridge on the county road near the house of Terry Tuttle on Willow creek.

Also for four stone piers, constructed in like manner on the south branch of Grande Ronde river near the house of J. L. Gayland. Said piers to be settled to good foundation and to be 22 ft. at base and 16 ft. by 2 ft. at top, and to be as high as the present bridge.

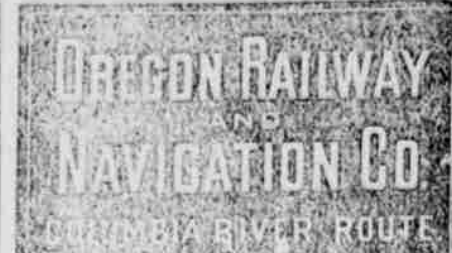
