The following extracts are made from the old Connecticut "blue laws," which were so called because they were printed on blue paper:

"The governor, and magistrates convened in general assembly are the supreme power, under God, of this independent dominion. From the determination of the assembly no appeal shall be made.

No man shall be a freeman or have a vote unless he is converted and a member of one of the churches allowed in the dominion.

Each freeman shall swear by the blessed God to bear true allegiance to this dominion, and that Jesus is the only king.

No dissenter from the essential worship of this dominion shall be allowed to give a vote for electing magistrates or any officer.

No food or lodging shall be offered to a heretic.

No one shall cross the river on the Sabbath but an authorized clergyman. No one shall traxel, cook victuals, make beds, sweep houses, cut hair or shave on the Sabbath day.

No one shall kiss his or her children on the Sabbath or fasting days.

The Sabbath shall begin at sunset Saturday.

Whoever brings cards or dice into the dominion shall pay a fine of £5.

No one shall eat mince pies, dance, play eards or play any instrument of music except the drum, trumpet or jewshurp.

No gospel preacher shall join people in marriage. The magistrate may join them in marriage, as he may do it with less scandal to Christ's church.

No man shall court a maid in person or by letter without obtaining the consent of her parents; £5 penalty for the first offense, £10 for the second, and for the third imprisonment during the pleasure of the court."

There is an element in this city which would like to have just such laws emacted here with even far more sumptuary additions. They would like to say what sort of bread others shall eat, and they would like to say that a glass of wine at dinner should be prohibited. They would like to also say that certain organizations of feeble-minded men and strong-minded women should be the governing power mentioned in the first paragraph.

Then there are others who would like to affiliate and rule with the abovementioned, while they got drunk and gambled on the sly; dance, clad in the brief authority of an undershirt with women of the town at unseemly hours; cheat their neighbors at any opportunity and revile, slander and misuse those to whom they owe gratitude all the time.
