Bow the Busy Birds Secure Provisions For Winter Consumption.

In stripping off the bark, I observed It perforated with holes larger than those which a musket bullet would make, speared with most accurate precision, as if bored under the guidance of a rule and compass, and many of them filled most neatly with acorns.

Earlier in the season I remarked the holes in most all the soft timber: but, imagining they were caused by wood insects, I did not stop to examine or inquire; but now finding them studded with acorns firmly fixed in, which I knew could not have been driven there by the wind, I sought for an explanation, which was practically given me by Captain S---'s pointing out a flock of woodpeckers busily and noisily employed in the provident task of securing their winter's provisions, for it appears that the sagacious bird is not all the time thriftlessly engaged in "tapping the hollow beach tree" for the mere idle purpose of empty sound, but spends its summer season in picking those holes, in which it lays its store of food for the winter. where the elements can neither affect nor place it beyond their reach, and it is considered a sure omen that the snowy period is approaching when these birds commence stowing away their acorns, which otherwise might be covered by its fall.

I frequently paused from my chopping to watch them in my neighborhood, with the acorns in their bills, half clawing, half flying round the tree, and admired the adroitness with which they tried at the different holes. until they found one of its exact caliber, when, inserting the pointed end, they tapped it home most artistically with their beaks, and flew down for another. But their natural instinct is even more remarkable in the choice of the nuts, which you will invariably find sound; whereas it is a matter of impossibility, in selecting them for roasting, to pick up a batch that will not have half of them unfit for use, the most safe and polished-looking frequently containing a large grub generated within. Even the wily Indian, with all his craft and experience, is unable to arrive at any thing like an unerring selection, while in a large bag full that we took from the bark of our log, there was not one containing the slightest germ of decay. They never encroach on their packed stores until all on the surface are covered, when they resort to those in the bark, and peck them of their contents without removing the shell from the holes. -N. Y. Ledger.

AMERICAN COD-LIVER OIL How and Where It Is Made-A Favorite

Remedy of Consumptives. American cod-liver oil is made here. The livers of the cod. haddock, pollock, hake and cusk are used in the manufacture. Only about one-third of the American output of this oil is procured from cod-livers.

From September until March the livers are fat and in the best condition. A bucketful of livers will then yield about six quarts of oil. Only four quarts of this, however, can be made suitable for medicinal purposes, the remaining two quarts is of an inferior rectly

quality and is used by curriers. From March to June the livers are thin and inferior, and will yield only one-half as much oil. Cod-liver oil for medicinal purposes must be made and are being published daily. from livers of fish that have not been dead over forty-eight hours. Fishing vessels on their long trips to the banks save the fish-livers in hogsheads and sell them to the oil-manufacturers for thirty cents per bucketful. From these livers an inferior quality of oil is made that is used by tanners.

Up to about fifteen years ago the most primitive means were used for obtaining oil from livers. The results were very unsatisfactory, and the best portion of the liver was wasted. The old method was to expose the livers to the action of the sun until the oil was dried out. Only a small percentage of oil was thus secured, and the residue was thrown away as useless. Now every portion of the liver is used. The method is to put the livers into a large tin-lined vat having a coil of perforated steam pipes in the bottom. A pressure of thirty pounds of steam is put on the boiler, and the steam escaping through the perforations in the pipes saturates the liver with hot steam and thus fries out the oil. In half an hour after steam is turned on all the oil that can be procured by trying out will have arisen to the surface. The livers, now termed "blubber," will have sunk to the bottom of the vat. The oil is bailed off and put into barrels to cool and settle, after which it is refined by being allowed to freeze till it is of the consistency of thick mush, when it is put into drilling bags and the pure oil pressed out in a heavy iron press. The oil that is pressed through drilling is considered refined, and after being put up in new barrels of forty-five gallons for about 36 cents per gallon. farmers as a fertilizer at \$9 per ton. The best quality of cod-liver oil comes from Norway. It is much clearer and whiter than the American oil. It is put up in tin casks holding thirty gallons each, inclosed in wooden barrels. The claim is made that no livers except those of the codfish are used in its manufacture, but American manufacturers strongly suspect that it owes its remarkable clearness to its having been mixed with seal oil. Twenty dollars per gallon is considered a low price for this oil, and it sometimes goes as high as \$28. America is the largest buyer of Norwegian oil.

Newfoundland cod-liver oil ranks next to the Norwegian oil. It is made entirely of the livers of young cod caught off the Labrador coast. Portland has a cod-liver oil factory that produces 500 barrels per year-306 barrels of refined oil for medicinal purposes and 200 barrels of "curriers"


