EDITOR OREGON SCOUT :-Crack! crash! and a heavy and peculiar jarring thud upon the earth, are sounds familiar to the ears of dwellers in the long leaf pine forests. They are the sounds of the fall of the magnificant trees, as they fall beneath the stroke of the woodman's axe. As we hear these sounds and see growths of many long years falling to the bosom of Mother Earth, the question comes place this rapid loss? Whence came the first seeds from which these valuable trees spring? And do they bear anything upon themselves to reproduce their kind? One question must be left unanswered. No man knows whence came the seed from which have sprung the original pines. The other questions may be answered. Nature is at work to recover the rapid loss of the grown pines, and these pines do bear upon the madves the seeds to reproduce pines. Let us study these facts or works of Nature, and we shall find that she is giving us lessons of interest and instriction.

If all vegetation dropped its leaves in autumn, a very large part of the earth's surface would be bare and brown, through the long winter months. But Nature has given us the evergreens; fresh and living evidence of her life and months of winter. The largest family of these evergreens are the cone bearers; and in this family, the long leafed pine bears the largest cone. These cones are as much an ornament to the | 42 E tree as a rose bloom to the shrub; and exist for the same purpose; viz, to bear the seeds or mast as they are called by the rescale living among the pines, Once in two years these cones mature, and bear naked seed in the axil of their long, hard and paddle shaped sepals. Soon after the whole brush is above ground, if the piney woods hog does not eat out the bud, a stem appears; rough with scales or hulls, and about an meh in diameter.
