The Hunt railroad graders have got so far down the valley that they are beyond our jurisdiction.

The new register of the La Grande land office, Mr. Lon Cleaver, will enter upon his duties in a few days.

The poles for the electric light plant will be erected in a few days and the wires strung. The work is being pushed as rapidly as possible.

The block in North Union belonging to Ed. Davis and John Welsh has been enclosed with a substantial fence and the premises will be otherwise improved.

A company has been incorporated in Union for the purpose of manufacturing brick and the work will commence at once. Mr. Totterdell, one of the incorporators, and an experienced mason and architect, informs us that a contract has been signed by Wm. Wilson for the construction of a brick building on the corner of Main and A streets, size 28x60. Negotiations are being made by several parties and contracts will be signed in a few days for the erection of three or four more brick buildings. Work on the Wilson brick will be pushed rapidly.

J. L. Woodell and Jas. McKenzie, two substantial farmers of Summerville, bought this week from O. W. Parsell, the horse dealer, the imported Clydesdale, Dalmian, which traces his pedigree to the noted prizewinner, Prince of Wales, No. 673, the purchase price was \$1900. The La Grande electric lights are a complete success and every thing worked smoothly from the first. Already 300 lights have been subscribed for and without doubt the company will set their dynamos in motion with between 400 and 500 lights. This is another comparison of the enterprise of La Grande and Union which Union need not be ashamed of.

J. W. Shelton president of the Union Electric Power and Light Co. is in receipt of a telegram from manager C. J. Smith, of the U. P., stating that their surveyors who have been employed at Elgin will be in Union to-day for the purpose of surveying the motor line from this city to the depot. The Electric Co. employed these surveyors for the reason that the U. P. Co. will not allow outside surveyors to locate switches from their road. A switch will also be located from the main line, near North Powder, to the Hutchinson Bros. ranch. This will enable the Hutchinson Bros to ship the immense quantities of grain they have stored at their ranch direct to their mill in this city.

**Nomination of a County Ticket—Declaration of Principles—Penoyer For Governor.**

The convention was called to order by A. C. Craig chairman of the Democratic Central Committee. After making the usual introductory remarks, a vote for temporary chairman resulted in the selection of Hon. Dunham Wright of Medical Springs. Mr. H. Rothchilds of North Powder was elected secretary and Mr. H. C. Rinehart of Summerville, assistant secretary.

At this time Mr. Slater raised an objection to N. Blum acting as a member of the committee on credentials, on the grounds that Mr. Blum was not a delegate to the convention; he only holding a proxy. Some spirited remarks followed and O. P. Goodall to quiet any further discussion moved the chair appoint three additional persons on the committee on credentials—carried. The chair appointed O. P. Goodall, Union; B. F. Ousley, La Grande; L. R. Holmes, Cove.

Motion to adjourn till one o'clock, sharp, carried.

ize the burthen thereof as nearly as may be upon wealth to the end that labor be lightly burdened; that radical changes are needed in our assessment laws and collection of taxes, and that all property, real and personal, be made to contribute its equal share of support to necessary government.

Resolved, That we favor the repeal of the so-called mortgage tax law, coupled with the repeal of the law allowing indebtedness to be deducted from assessments; that we favor the adoption of the Australian ballot system of voting in this state, to the end that fraud be eliminated from the ballot boxes thereof.

Resolved, That we assert the power of the state to control and regulate the transporting of passengers and freight in this state, and affirm it to be the duty of the legislature of this state to provide against extortion and unreasonable charges for the same.

Resolved, That we recognize in D. P. Thompson, the nominee of the republican party of this state, for governor, the champion of the exemption of the so-called water works bonds from taxation, a proposition unworkable in principle, unjust to taxpayers and solely in the interest of capitalists, and his election would be an endorsement of a most vicious system of legislation, under and behind which capital would hide and escape its just portion of the burthen of government.

Resolved, That Hon. Sylvester Penoyer, as governor of this state deserves the unanimous plaudit of the voters thereof, for his manly courage in arresting at the very beginning every attempt by a republican legislature to foist upon the people a system so unjust and vicious in principle as the exemption of municipal bonds from taxation, by the only remedy in his hands, the veto power.

Resolved, That the renomination of Hon. Sylvester Penoyer for governor, and Hon. G. W. Webb for treasurer would meet the hearty approval of the democracy of Union county.

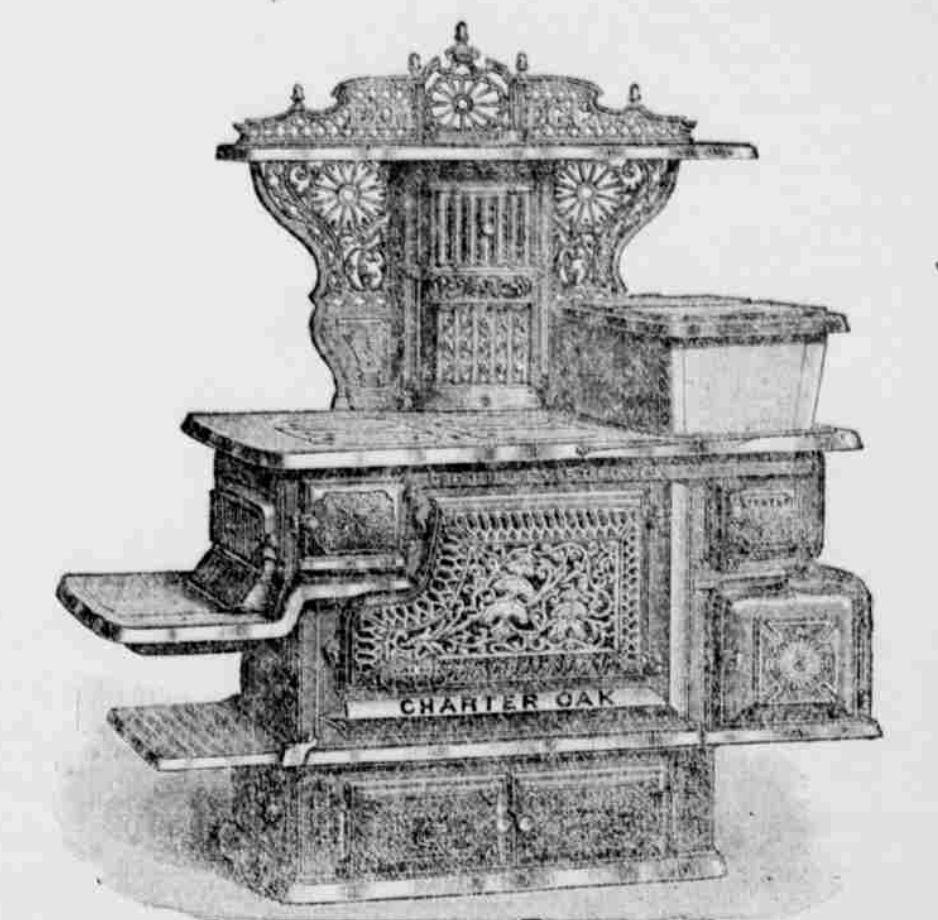
