The unusual amount of snow which fell during the past winter and has remained upon the highest ranges was a wise provision of nature, for as the season advances the hot rays of a noon-day sun causes it to melt and run down the mountain sides in the shape of nature's life giving fluid which indispensable beverage in ranching, mining (as well as the milk business) is self evident to any average citizen. Every placer mine in this vicinity is run to its fullest capacity with an abundance of water to spare.

BULGER FLAT PLACERS.

are located on Bulger flat near the Van Patten saw mills are the property of J. B. Gardener of Baker City and Chas. Casebar and have been worked for the past ten years with varying success by various parties. L. W. Nelson operated them two years ago and it is reported took out about \$2,000 while last season's run amounted to about \$2,500 under Helderbrand and Casebar's supervision. Work commenced again here about one month ago by the latter parties who are now employing a force of four men besides themselves and will put on a night shift in a short time and run it to its fullest capacity, without doubt successfully.

LAWRENCE PLACER MINE.

is located near the North Powder river above Gardner's mill and has been lying idle for several years but was good paying property years since when rightfully managed. A report was in circulation that it had been bonded recently to some unknown parties for the sum of \$18,000, and would be worked the present season, yet the rumor lacks confirmation at present writing. Well informed parties are sanguine that gold in paying quantities is to be had by proper management. It would doubtless prove a bonanza in the hands of good placer miners with the proper facilities for working it.

GOLD HILL.

lies one mile east of the town of Haines and has been prospected for the past three years for gold in paying quantities, a number of shafts have been sunk and tunnels run on various claims, and quartz assaying as high as \$40,000 per ton has been taken out. With the completion of the reduction works at Baker City, mining here would take a boom as the ore can be reduced at home with less expense than formerly. Messrs. Hall and Hamlin some two months since accidentally discovered a placer mine near the summit of the hill, in paying quantities, but being compelled to haul their ground to the river, and the crude outfit for saving the gold not being a success, they have suspended work for the present.

ELKHORN BAISLEY MINE.

together with the "Robbins" and Elkhorn Bonanza are situated near Pine creek across the valley from Haines, being only about seven miles distant, this being the nearest point to the railroad and will eventually we hope be their shipping station. The successful operation of these mines is daily heralded to the world through the medium of the press of Baker City. The "Elkhorn Bonanza" (said to be an extension of the Elkhorn Baisley) owners have placed shares on the market which are now selling at ten cents a share in order to raise money to develop the mine. Should it prove as rich as the Elkhorn Baisley, stock cannot be bought at any reasonable figure within the next twelve months.

HAINES TOWN.

a station on the Union Pacific railroad was laid out four years ago on the donation land claim of Judge J. B. Haines, situated eleven miles from Baker City and nine miles from North Powder, in the center of the richest agricultural lands in Baker county and in juxtaposition to the richest mining districts of this region. No effort has been made by Judge Haines or the citizens to boom the town, yet real estate deals are of almost daily occurrence, in as much as an addition of sixteen new blocks recently platted, and a major portion of which have been sold, will testify. Should the railroad lands lying contiguous be disposed of to a German colony of farmers (now under consideration, Haines will assume the aspects of a good sized town.
