The officers of the society shall consist of one president, one vice president from each precinct in Union county, one secretary and one treasurer who shall hold their office one year and until their successors are elected.

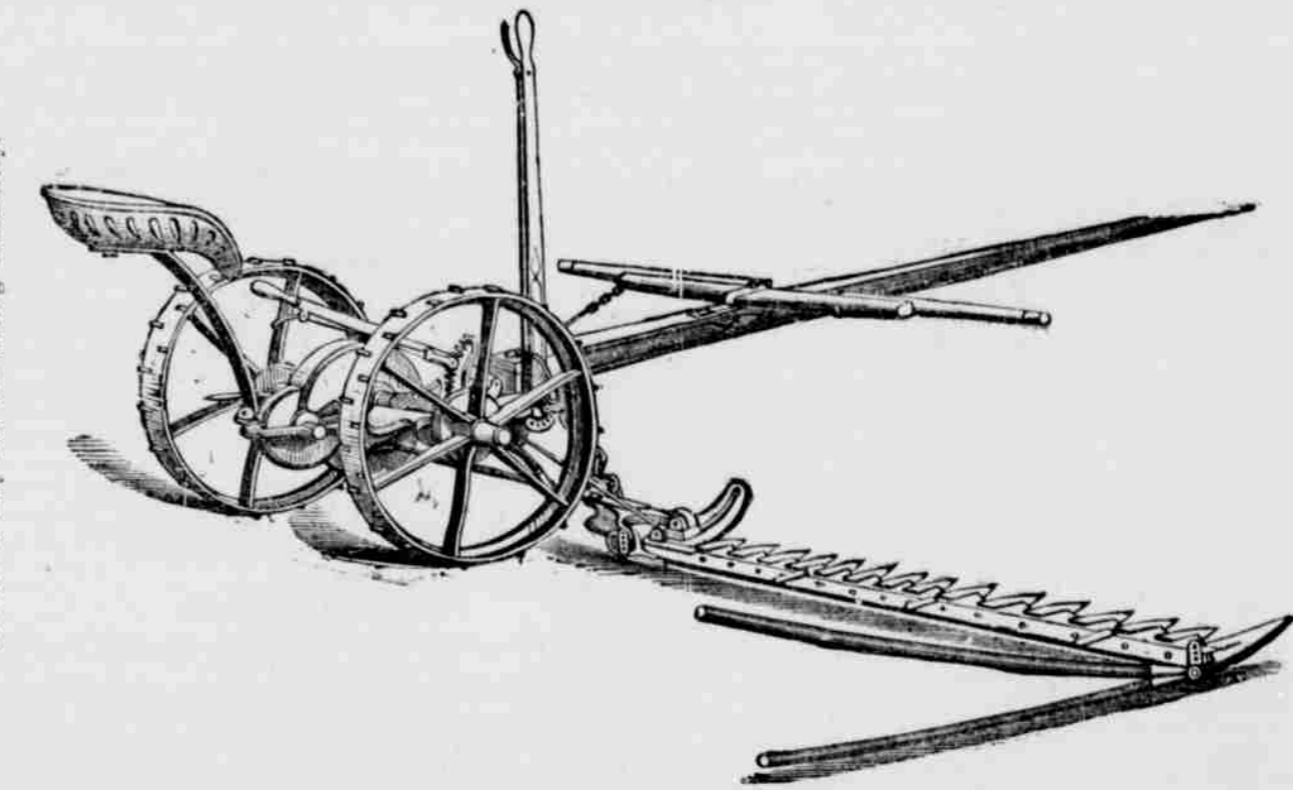
