THE PACIFIC COAST.

The San Francisco Sugar Supply Reported Short.

The U. S. District Judge at Seattle Refuses to Dismiss the Case Against Beecher.

Helena, Mont., has incorporated a mining exchange. The citizens of Fresno believe firebugs are again at work in their city.

A suit testing the legality of the sheep ordinance of Tuolumne county is on trial at Sonora.

The Hall of Records and the lot on which it stands at Santa Rosa have been sold for \$25,000.

The authors of the San Diego filibuster story are daily filing protests against the general public unbelief.

Frauds in the matter of saloon licenses have been unearthed at Spokane Falls, and several arrests have followed.

The cowboys in Wyoming at a station called Wendover gave one of their number forty lashes with a whip for stealing a saddle.

Benevolent ladies of Los Angeles have established a home for newboys, and the society will help poor mothers and their children.

The Secretary of War has reduced Corporal George Colby of Company G, First Infantry, now at Angel Island, Cal., to the ranks.

Rev. Samuel W. Small has been elected to the Presidency of the Utah University of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Ogden.

Marysville has 1,200 persons under seventeen years of age. Sacramento's census shows 5,351 children in the city under seventeen years of age.

The Swede captured at Reno, Nev., and who it was thought was the man who murdered Edward Goodman near Sacramento over a week ago, turns out to be the wrong man.

The Postmaster General has ordered the establishment of a free delivery system at the following offices, service beginning July 1: Ogden, Utah; Santa Barbara, Cal.; Santa Cruz, Cal.

Mrs. Oscar Steiner, who was charged at Butte, Mont., with an attempt to blow her sleeping husband into the other world with giant powder, has been acquitted. Her accomplice, a man named Switzer, is still under arrest.

At Templeton contracts have been signed to burn a kiln of 450,000 brick and erect a Swedish Lutheran Church, with a seating capacity of 500 people.

The Bank of Templeton is about to enter into a contract to erect a large brick block.

M. A. Wheaton, asked \$300,000 for five acres of land that were condemned by the Truckee Irrigation Society, and in a jury trial a verdict for \$95 was given—the price of the land and \$20 for the division of the land. An appeal will be taken.

General Passenger Agent T. H. Goodman of the Southern Pacific has prepared a statement showing that the Southern Pacific had 18,032 more overland passengers in January, February, March and April of last year than it had during the first four months of this year.

A sailor who had imbibed too much liquor at Sacramento borrowed a pocket knife and immediately commenced slashing himself with it with the purpose of cutting himself open and taking out the poison which had been administered to him. He was prevented from injuring himself.

Judge Van Fleet has sentenced to death Charles Freeman, who murdered Mark Feeney by drowning him in a barrel, March 6, near the town of Antelope, Sacramento county, Cal. The date of hanging is not announced, but will be named in the warrant to be delivered by Sheriff McMullen within a few days.

EASTERN ITEMS.

Chicago Has a Great Real Estate Boom.

A New York Census Enumerator Commits Suicide at the End of His First Day's Work.

A fierce war in Chicago-New York passenger rates is said to be likely. The Indian Appropriation Bill carries an appropriation of nearly \$6,000,000.

Under the new law New York city will be cut up into 1,126 election districts. More than one-third of the Louisiana legislators are pledged against the lottery.

The salt trust scheme has been revived under the name of the North American Salt Union. Governor Thayer of Nebraska has revoked the call for an extra session of the Legislature.

Mrs. Flack's alimony has been fixed. She gets \$25 a week, her house and life policies for \$5,000.

At the close of his first day's work as census enumerator at New York, Frank Magu committed suicide. A signal service officer in Pittsburg says this has been the wettest season Western Pennsylvania has had in many years.

The Indian Commissioners are making little progress with the Sac and Fox Indians, who are divided on the question of sale. It is thought that it will not be wise to make another attempt during the present session of Congress to pass the copyright bill.

Complaints of inefficiency and lack of accommodation for immigrants at the New York barge office are growing in force and frequency.

The National Encampment of the Grand Army is to have the use of the Boston schoolhouses during the Encampment in August.

The first cremation at the Philadelphia Municipal Crematory was performed in the presence of Director Stockley and the health authorities last week.

The Government has taken formal possession of the dynamite cruiser Vesuvius, and that vessel has been placed in commission as a man-of-war.

The public debt statement for June 1 shows a total debt of \$1,591,362,690.69 and a net debt of \$1,008,858,808.68. This is a decrease of \$6,661,871.60 since May 1 and of \$67,787,722.77 since June 30 last.

The total emigration from Europe to the United States during the ten months ended April 30, 1890, was 318,615—an increase of 303 as compared with the corresponding months of the previous year.

Attorneys of the New Orleans lottery are taking the ground before the Legislature that the fight against the scheme is directed from the North and deserves no consideration from the people of Louisiana.

The World's Fair at Chicago expects to have the sarcophagus of Cleopatra and the mummy of Ramees on exhibition. It is claimed that in Caesar's camp, near Alexandria, the Cleopatra sarcophagus was recently found.

The United States Senate has passed, unanimously, the bill for the payment of \$60,000 to the assignees of John Roach. This is the sum which the Cleveland Administration refused to pay him on the Puritan and Roanoke.

Mr. Ketchum, engineer of the Chicago-Norfolk Marine Railway at Ottawa, has been asked by a New York syndicate to furnish an estimate for a marine railway for the thirty miles of the Panama Canal that are uncompleted.

The Court of Claims has dismissed the claim of A. B. Mullett against the United States for compensation as architect of the building now occupied by the State, War and Navy Departments, amounting to about \$150,000.

A Chicago paper says that by the completion of three deals within the past few days the school book publishing trust has been completed, 90 per cent. of that entire business in the United States having been taken in.

From all portions of the grape-growing sections of New York reports are favorable. In the Hudson River Valley, where the Concord grape is so largely and satisfactorily grown, growers are much elated over the appearance of their grape vines.

FOREIGN NEWS.

No More Absolution for Irish Boycotters.

The New Law of Universal Suffrage Adopted by the Cortes Not Extended to Cuba.

Local option is rapidly gaining ground in England. A municipal hall has been opened in Tientsin, and is named after General Gordon.

The Czar is to make strict inquiry into the Siberian scandals. Six lepers were lately arrested for begging in the market at Bombay.

Seville is infested with women barbers. They are pretty women, however. A well-known Dublin solicitor has absconded after extensive defalcations.

Atrocious crimes are attributed to bandits in the Aaraanian territory in Chile. An English syndicate has secured the contract for building the Cuban Central Railway.

A Paris correspondent says Count Herbert Bismarck is conspiring to obstruct Emperor William's policy. Lima has just experienced a most severe earthquake. It was followed by two shocks of more than usual violence.

The Governments of Germany, France, Russia and Switzerland have signed a treaty for the suppression of anarchy. Emperor William has informed Prince Bismarck that if he does not stop his press utterings the result will be serious.

A dispatch from Cairo says: England, Italy and Russia have given notice of their adhesion to the Egyptian conversion scheme. Russia is reported to be making ready to drop France and seek an alliance with Germany by way of dividing up the Balkan Peninsula.

Very imperfect and ineffective laws, known as the "Bee-houses Acts," have shut up 300 beer houses in Liverpool alone and 500 in Dublin.

The British Museum has received a Chinese bank note issued from the Imperial Treasury 300 years before the use of paper money in England.

The new law of universal suffrage adopted by the Spanish Cortes will not be extended to Cuba. This causes considerable dissatisfaction.

Paris is just now swarming with Americans. The principal hotels seem to have almost as many American guests as the Exposition attracted a year ago.

The business of the Transcaspian railway has reached a value of 120,000 rubles (about \$65,000 per week) from cotton, which is now largely cultivated in Central Asia.

Herr Schrader has been elected First Director of the American Truehand Association, the object of which is to deal in American securities and to represent the interests of holders of such securities.

Except at Kuttwar, in Bombay, and in central provinces, the Indian lion is almost extinct. He has disappeared before the railway. It is forbidden to kill those that remain, except occasionally in the way of sport.

Catholic Bishop O'Dwyer of Limerick has issued a pastoral letter withdrawing from priests in his diocese the power to grant absolution to persons guilty of boycotting or advocating and practicing the plan of campaign.

The Australian wine which was said to have such excellent prospects of being exported to Europe in great quantities, must now wait until they can get some wood in Australia fit to make casks. All that they have injures its flavor.

Rev. W. H. Murray, a missionary at Peking, has devised a system for teaching the blind and has reduced the Chinese language to 498 syllables. By this system the blind have been enabled to learn to read with marvelous facility.

Emile Blanchard, President of France's Academy of Sciences, announced that he can make silk straight from the material of the mulberry leaf, without resorting to the silkworm. It is inferior in richness and gloss to the present silk.

Stanley has suggested to the committee in charge of the Stanley Exhibition that the money raised be donated to the equipment of a steamer to ply on the Victoria Nyanza, in the service and for the benefit of the tribes in that section.

From several independent sources it is now ascertained that the cereal crops east of the mountains, especially in the fertile Patuxent country, Washington, will be abundant this year, and if only a fair price is realized by the farmers in the fall there will be lively. Wholesale merchants' orders show no falling off, and now that the strike is over retail stores are doing the usual amount of business.
