IRISH COUNTRY LIFE.

The Most Enjoyable Existence a Man of Leisure Can Lead.

On the whole, the Scotch and Irish are more pleasant, particularly to a sportsman; the English more dignified or, I might say, magnificent, on account of the size and appointments of the mansions, and the old historical surroundings. A great Irish house is more homely and genial. The host and hostess generally talk better; they put more stress upon their out-of-door appointments; they have better, or rather more interesting, gardens; better-bred horses, and are ready to put them at your disposal. The Irish country house is more natural. If you have not had early breakfast ordered, and arranged overnight for an early start, you come down to breakfast any hour you like within reasonable limits (9 to 10:30). You will generally find two or three little tables ready, various hot things at the fire, cold things on the sideboard. You will find three or four people at breakfast, others gone, some not down. The servants only come when summoned. Every body walks round and helps himself. You are asked at breakfast what you would like to do. Will you fish, or shoot, or hunt, or drive, according to the season, and the professed object of your visit? You are asked what shall be sent out with you for lunch. You will be sent in a dog-cart or other carriage, and some of the guests, or the host, will accompany you. If you are a real sportsman, you will work as hard all day as if you depended upon it for your dinner, and, indeed, in one sense you do, for you will gain an appetite for a dinner by itself. You bring your own guns, rods, horses, etc., if you come for the purpose of sport; if you are a fashionable man, you bring your own servant. But if any sudden chance arises, if you happen to come unprepared, there is always some means of fixing you up for a day's enjoyment. In this way you come to know the neighborhood as only sportsmen can know it; you will study the hills, the woods, the pools in the river with a deeper interest than mere curiosity, when you know that your success depends upon understanding these things.—J. Yet there were mothers who would make a boy put on a collar when they had company, and disgrace him before the world by making him stand round and help; they acted as though they had no sense and no pity; but such mothers were rare.—W. Japanese Bookmaking.

Having resolved to "paint" a book, for the Japanese use a brush and not a pen, the author betakes himself to his workroom. It is a little room, a very little room.

The author sits on the floor in a flowing garment of brown silk, lined with blue, his legs disposed comfortably under him. In front of him stands a lacquered table, about a foot square, and upon it are his writing materials, which are as idyllic as his surroundings—his paper is delicately tinted yellow, with blue lines running up and down.

His inkstand is a carved ebony slab, with one end hollowed out for water to rub his cube of india ink in, and holds the four or five daintily decorated bamboo brushes which are his pens. Naturally he does not write his novel, he paints it.

Beginning at the end of the whole, at the left of every page and at the top of every line, straight down between the two blue parallels his small brown hand goes with quick, delicate, dark touches.

Although the novelist's "copy" might seem to a stranger to be daintiness itself, yet he always has it duplicated "by an artist" before sending it to the publishers, the success of the book depending so largely upon its artistic form. The "artist" to whom the "copy" is now intrusted proceeds to repaint the long series of word pictures with a professional dexterity which is something astonishing.—New York Journal.
