COMMISSIONER'S COURT.

Record of the Business Transacted at the Recent November Session.

Road petitioned for by J. Q. Shirley et al; E. W. Imbler, Robert Shaw and H. Geer appointed to appraise damages claimed by J. M. Phy, to meet November 15th.

Road petitioned for by H. W. Lee et al; ordered opened.

Road petitioned for by G. F. Dunn et al; ordered opened.

Petition of the Oregon Railway Extensions Company for a franchise to lay a pipe for conveying water through certain streets of Elgin, an unincorporated town, was granted.

Road petitioned for by J. Wilson et al; continued.

Liquor licenses granted to Cunningham & Gallagher and Dill & Brown, of Cornucopia, for a period of six months each.

County Judge Sanders was instructed by the court to order made any necessary repairs on the court house building, also to purchase any furniture, etc. necessary for the proper furnishing of the new county clerk's office.

An appropriation of \$150 was made to improve the road petitioned for by L. L. Holcomb et al, leading from Pine to Eagle valley, provided the citizens of that locality contribute a like sum.

Warrant ordered drawn for \$129.80 the balance due J. D. Guild, assessor.

W. H. Stafford appointed supervisor of road district No. 2, vice Joshua Bradford, deceased.

A COTTON PRESS.

Methods of Baling and Marketing Cotton in the South.

RALEIGH, N. C. Nov. 1, 1890.

EDITOR OREGON SCOUT:—

A cotton gin and cotton press are generally together. A cotton compress is a different concern. Cotton gins and presses are located near the planter. The cotton compress is located at the principal shipping points.

The gin is a machine, invented by a Yankee schoolmaster down South, for the purpose of separating the seeds from the lint. A good healthy cotton boll will contain more than twenty seeds. The cotton as picked from the boll is poured into a hopper and the seeds and lint pour out separately. The cotton press is very much like a hay press; making the bales larger than the hay bale. A cotton bale as it leaves the press is about two and a half feet thick, four feet wide and six feet long. It is partially covered by coarse sackcloth of some kind and hooped with tarred iron straps. Its weight will vary from four hundred and fifty to five hundred pounds. Buyers for shipping are now paying from nine to ten cents per pound. The weight of bales varies so little, that a cotton planter will tell the value of his land or crop by telling how many bales his land will produce.

At the time of this writing, farmers are hurrying the cotton to market as fast as possible. About mid-day on a pleasant day, the street leading to the compress is almost a solid procession of teams, wagons, and carts, hauling from one to five bales. We have seen downright races between mule teams; for the first place in reaching the cotton platform. The cotton platform surrounds the compress and is three hundred by five hundred feet in extent. On the street edge of this platform are offices and weighing scales of buyers. The number of bales brought on a good day is nearly enough to cover this platform with bales standing on end. These bales, of the size above given, are too large for railways and steamships. They must be made smaller, not by division but by compression. And now we are ready for the compress. The machinery sug-

gests the powerful machinery of large iron working establishments. It has no engine, and yet its huge press, steam pipes, and frame, resemble the cylinder and the frame of a large side wheel steamer. The boilers are one hundred and sixty horse power; and carry, for every day work, one hundred and ten pounds of steam. The work of this huge and powerful machine is to compress the ordinary cotton bale of market, into a bale of one third its size for shipment. The bale is placed on its edge, on a large iron surface, after its iron banding has been partially removed. The steam is let into a large pipe, and the iron platform, with its fleecy white load, rises, pressing the cotton against another immovable iron table above. The lint is compressed with as much ease, apparently, as our readers would crush the first fall of fleecy snow in your hands. The bale goes into the compress so hard, as not to be easily cut or torn apart. While in it, busy hands put new iron bands around it, so rapidly, that an observer will watch a long time before seeing how it is done. The bale leaves the compress, one third its original size and so hard that the dry hooks of the laborers will not penetrate beyond the sacking. The bales are now ready for shipment. Our readers can see them at any cotton mill in the North or West. A fair idea of the amount of cotton handled can be formed from this fact; a good concern will compress a bale a minute during the whole twenty-four hours. Three hundred and twenty-four tons of cotton. Nearly sixty thousand dollars in value before shipment; or one hundred thousand dollars at the mills of the North.
