The Alliance Policy.

The National Farmer's Alliance has decided to call a convention next year and nominate a candidate for the presidency. This means a possible failure of the people to elect, but a certainty of the success of the democratic candidate, either in the electoral college or in congress. If the election were to be held now the alliance would have a reasonable hope of carrying South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Kansas, Nebraska the Dakotas and Minnesota. This would prevent either party from securing a majority, and would throw the election into the house where the democrats would have everything their own way. It is impossible to say, of course, whether the Alliance will be stronger or weaker next year than it is now, but at present it is certainly growing stronger.

It will have to modify its programme however, before it can attract general support from outside of its own ranks. The land mortgage scheme is not one on which any party can safely go through a presidential campaign. One of the resolutions which exhibits a characteristic misconception declares that "we, as land owners, pledge ourselves to demand that the government allow us to borrow money from the United States at the same rate of interest as do banks." Banks do not borrow money from the United States. The National banks are allowed to issue their own notes to the extent of 90 per cent of the face value of such United States bonds as they may hold, but these notes are not legal-tender, and nobody is obliged to take them if he does not want them. The government also keeps certain small balances on deposit in the banks, not for their convenience, but for its own. The money is subject to call at a moment's notice, when needed to make payments. Farmers would hardly care to borrow on such terms. The system of deposits is a vicious one at best, and should be restricted to as narrow limits as possible instead of being extended.

The prospects of carrying any southern States for the alliance candidates next year will be seriously impared if the indorsement of the Conger lard bill is allowed to stand. Lard is a trivia!



.... Crop Weather Bulletin No. 2.

The following is the report of the Oregon Weather Bureau for the week ending Saturday, March 21, 1891:

WEATHER-The temperature has risen, but is yet slightly below the normal. Showers fell during the week, but not average amount. Generally partly cloudy weather prevailed, the sun when shining being quite warm. An occasional light frost occurred in Western Oregon. In Eastern Oregon frosts were frequent at night, the days being quite warm. The snow is about all gone from the valleys of Eastern Oregon, though there yet remains plenty in the foothills and in the mountains. The melting snow generally soaked into the earth, making the soil very wet. In Western Oregon the soil is very wet from the February rains and March showers. Strong south and southwest winds prevailed Thursday, of Hannah's addition to the town of West Friday and Saturday.

CROPS-Owing to the wet soil conditions in Western Oregon, melting snow and wet soil in Eastern Oregon, spring seeding has generally been delayed. Some plowing has been done on the higher lands of Western Oregon and in parts of Southern Oregon. While the weather conditions have not been up to the average, yet they have been very favorable to the fall and winter sown grain which is invariably reported to be in a most prosperous and promising condition. Considerable growth has been made during the week. In the Willamette valley, especially, the soil is wet which retards spring work. In parts of Western Oregon peach and apricot trees are in blossom, quince trees showing leaves, berry bushes and shrubs are leafing, other fruit trees have swelling buds. Warmer weather with sunshine is needed throughout the entire state. The season is slightly later than usual. The prosperous condition of the fall wheat, the wet condition of the soil and the backward weather conditions all tend towards a hountiful harvest.




