Crop-Weather, Bulletin No. 3.

The observer of the Oregon Weather Bureau, of Portland, Oregon, has issued the bulletin for the week ending March 28, which is as follows:

WEATHER.

Continued cool, partly cloudy weather, with showers, has prevailed. The nights have been very cool, several frosts occurring, which did no damage. A slight hail storm of small area occurred in Clackamas and Wasco counties on the 27th, and in Washington county on the 27th. Snow fell on the Cascades on the 17th and 20th, also in Morrow county on the 22d which melted as fast as it fell. Some snow yet remains on the ground in Gilliam, Grant, Crook and Klamath counties. In the mountains the snow has not yet commenced to melt. In parts of Oregon the ground freezes at night and thaws in the day time.

CROPS.

The showers during the week have kept the soil very moist, so much so that in the Willamette valley spring seeding and plowing has been greatly retarded. Seeding is further advanced in Southern Oregon, while in Umatilla county it is about one-half done. In Morrow county an unusually large acreage will be sown. Throughout all of Eastern Oregon the soil is well moistened and the prospects for excellent crops are good. Throughout the state winter wheat is reported to have stood the winter well and to be of good stand and color. There was very little frozen out in Clackamas county the wheat is six inches high.

Grass has a good start, but is somewhat slow in growth. In Yamhill county the acreage of oats, hay and fruit has increased, the latter very largely so. There is a slight shortage in winter wheat.

Fruit is very backward. The season is very favorable to it however, for it's being now retarded insures it against a possible late frost. Peaches, almonds and apricots are in bloom in many sections; pear and cherry buds are swelling. Currants, goose and strawberries are in bloom. Fruit prospects are, indeed, very flattering and if no unusual conditions arise the yield will be large. The stock are reported in good condition. Range is good for them and there has been little loss during the winter. The lambing season is on and there is very little loss reported. Less rain would be more beneficial to them. The spring wool clip promises to be large, clean and of good quality.

HEALTH.

Lagrippe is prevalent in some sections but no deaths. Measles are common in various counties. The general health is, however, good.

The general conditions of the weather most needed are warmth and sunshine with occasional showers.
