COUNTY COURT.

Important Session Held Last Week.

DISTRIBUTION OF ROAD FUND.

The Court House to be Improved—Additional Cells to the Jail—Bridges to be Built.

The commissioners' court was in session a few days last week and transacted a large amount of business, as follows:

In the matter of distribution of road fund; it appearing to the court that there is \$1,227.95 in the road fund for the former distribution, and that there is \$1,190.00 of the common fund due to the road fund for road poll taxes collected, making \$2,417.95 which is now collectable for distribution, and it appearing also that there are taxes uncollected which would increase the fund to over \$4,500.00 and that the same will be collected, and it appearing necessary to make all the road fund available at once for use on the roads, it was ordered that \$2,182.05 be transferred for that purpose from the common fund and that the remainder of the uncollected road fund be turned into the common fund as fast as collected. Therefore the road fund distribution among the road districts was made as follows:

It will be noticed that in the foregoing distribution some of the districts are not mentioned. The court was of the opinion that the former distribution of \$100 for each district would probably cover all that those districts were entitled to, but realizing the impossibility of making an equitable distribution on the knowledge which the court had, it thought best to reserve a portion of the fund undistributed at present in order to correct any inequalities and do justice to all the districts as soon as the court could find out what is needed. Therefore \$1,050.00 was reserved for this purpose.

In the matter of warrant for collection of delinquent taxes; court ordered that the warrant on the delinquent tax roll be made returnable on Sept. 1, 1891, so as to give the sheriff time to advertise and sell all property on which taxes have not been paid.

In the matter of improvement of court house; the court decided not to build any extension, but to re-roof and repair present building. Contract let to S. L. Hunter to cement and sand finish the outside and repair all places where plastering is broken on inside, for \$725.00. Contract let to Chas. C. Coffinberry for putting on cedar shingle roof, new cornice and repairing the windows and interior wood work, including two jury rooms, for \$821.35.

In the matter of ferry license on Snake river; continued for term.

In the matter of resignation of L. C. Marley; resignation accepted and G. F. Dunn appointed.

In the matter of resignation of J. B. Alderman; continued for term.

In the matter of sheriff's return of delinquent school list for district No. 5; sheriff ordered to turn over all monies (over costs) in his hands.

In the matter of bridge over Catherine creek in Union; petition denied for want of jurisdiction of the court, the same not being a county road, but a city street.

In the matter of road petition filed by E. E. Taylor et al; ordered opened. In the matter of bridge over Eagle creek at upper crossing; clerk ordered to advertise for bids to build a bridge of 90 feet on good stone abutments.

In the matter of Ore Dell bridge; ordered that Commissioner Arnold have the bridge repaired and placed in good safe condition for travel.

In the matter of Robbs road; it appearing to the court that some dispute has arisen in regard to the line of this road, it is ordered that Wm. Moss, Al. Hughes and Thos. Ousley be appointed viewers, and J. L. Curtis surveyor, to view said road and that they meet at Ore Dell bridge June 13, 1891.

In the matter of Shirley road; it appearing that petitioners have not yet paid damages, and that the road is of as great public utility to the county as to petitioners, it is ordered that damages to Phy and Holmes be paid by the county.

Liquor license granted to James Nicholson, of Pine valley, for six months.

Liquor license granted to Childers & Holbrook, of Hilgard, for one year.

In the matter of Tarter road; report read; ordered that A. P. Greenar be appointed supervisor, and that \$500 be drawn at once out of the appropriation, to be expended.

In the matter of Kimbrell road; mandate from circuit court; judgment heretofore referred and supervisor to be notified that review was sustained in circuit court.

In the matter of improvement of county jail; contract let to Vandorn Iron Works for two cells, for \$2,430.00, their bid being about \$1,000.00 lower than any other.

In the matter of final report of grand jury; report read and laid over for further consideration.

In the matter of cancellation of old county warrants; clerk presented to the court a list of county warrants issued more than seven years ago and never presented to the treasurer for payment, as provided in the Act of 1887, and was ordered to advertise those which are outstanding as provided in said Act.

It appearing to the court that the line of the county road beginning at the corner of Bloom's land in Cove, and extending north to Lower Cove, is in dispute, and the same ought to be re-surveyed in order to find the exact line, it is therefore ordered that a new survey be made of said road, and that James Hendershott, H. J. Geer and H. L. Daugherty be appointed viewers, and J. L. Curtis surveyor, to meet on June 17, 1891.
