Dr. Ballard was a young physician and ever since he came to this city has been importuning Miss Ison, who came here with her mother to attend college, to marry him, She thought much of him, but begged him to postpone the event until after her education was completed. This morning he appeared at the house and had an interview with Miss Ison in the parlor, While talking with her he pulled out a revolver and shot her twice, once through the head and heart, producing instant death. The doctor then shot himself five times, dying in a few min-

The sad occurrence will be a severe blow to Mrs. Ison, who only a few months ago lost her husband. She has the sympathy of many kind friends and relatives throughout Union and Baker counties.
