McCorkin's land claim; thence south to the county road; thence east to the west line of Patterson's Second Addition; thence south to the south line of E Street; thence east to the depot grounds; thence north sixteen rods; thence east to the river. Petitions for and against the extension have been circulated and numerous signatures secured. Most of the opposition arises from a misapprehension of what is to be included in the extension of the limits."
