THE COMING FAIR.
The Daily Oregonian, of last Tuesday, gave a very important editorial under the above heading to which we wish to call the attention of our readers. The following paragraph we reprint for the purpose of emphasizing it.

Other general features are valuable in their way, and very proper, but the fair should be distinctly a farmers' fair. Of late years the exhibit of stock has not been what it should be. By not taking advantage of the great gathering at Salem farmers neglect one of their very best market opportunities. The fair ought to be the market place for stock of all kinds, and it would be if people who have stock to sell would only bring it out. The best grades of cattle and horses are to be found in this state, and for sale, but nobody knows where to find them. A little enterprise on the part of stock owners would result in a great addition of interest to the fair and in profit to themselves.

We have frequently noticed that the State agricultural fair is counted a success by the papers just in proportion as the Agricultural society has succeeded in getting through without being seriously involved in debt. If you ask a Salem man as to the success of the State fair, he will usually place his estimate upon it from the standpoint of dollars and cents to the city of Salem. If you interrogate a large class of farmers who attend as to their opinion of its success, you will find it based upon the number of people who attend. Now, while all these may be integral elements of a successful fair, they entirely lose sight of the essential element. If a State fair is instrumental in helping to develop the various wealth producing industries of the state it is a success; but if it fails in this it is a failure, even though every man, woman and child in the State attend it, and though thousands of dollars be poured into the coffers of business men where it is held. Never has the financial success of the Agricultural Society very much to do with the success of the fair, except inasmuch as the managers may or may not be embarrassed. As the Oregonian says it should be "distinctly a farmers' fair."

And every possible effort should be made to induce a good display of the best products of the State. The suggestion of the Oregonian in regard to bringing stock to the fair for sale is certainly a good move, and the fair grounds should be so arranged as to furnish stable-stalls for all kinds of stock. It is certainly to be hoped that our Agricultural fair this fall will take higher rank than ever before.

MORALITY IN SOCIETY.

All parties will agree that morality is essential to good society, yet few persons seem to entertain correct views as to what morality is, or the obligations it lays upon us as individuals. Morality can better be defined negatively, or by way of contrast. It is the attitude of all vice of every form. Whatever is vicious, or tends in any way to degrade society, is antagonistic to good morals. One of the great difficulties in the way of establishing good morals in the community is the tendency of men to excuse, in themselves, what their sense of right leads them to condemn in society at large. When we speak of the best interests of society we invariably exclude ourselves. We seem to entertain a feeling that we, as individuals, are at liberty to indulge in any number of vices, which, of course, can not be tolerated in society. All this comes of two things, viz: The most unjust selfishness upon our part, and the want of a proper conception of what society is.

If we could only lose sight of our selfishness long enough to realize that that society is ourselves and our neighbors, we would be much more concerned with the weight of the duties which society lays upon us. It is only when we come to feel that we indulge vice society is vicious in proportion, that we are prepared to help correct the morals of the community. We are society, and, therefore, society is just what we are. This brings us to examine ourselves. Let us at once take an inventory of our stock of vices and see whether we are carrying more than society can afford. If we find we are, then, in the interest of society, let us begin to lop them off, even though they be as dear as a right eye. Let us not expect our neighbor to sacrifice more, and be better than we. Young man, say to yourself, "I, and my associates, constitute society. If we are vicious then society is bad." If this does not cause reformation you are in a hopeless condition.

NOT BELIEVED.

We were not bilious as Brother Sittes, of the Albany Democrat, imagines when we wrote our article headed "Very Unneighborly." On the contrary we live in the present air and drink the purest water on the American continent. We are very good, however, the information we received is incorrect. As we took occasion to say in our first mention of the matter, it is now shown to believe that the people of Albany could entertain any such feeling toward us as we indicated in the reference. And as there can be no possible connection between the two towns we could

see no reason why Albany should intentionally mistreat us. Friend Sittes thinks Dallas is need of a school house, and as a reason for his opinion he quotes two words from the ITEMIZER in which the orthography is incorrect. Well, we are glad to know that our conferees has read our paper so carefully. In regard to the two words, one of them was marked on the proof, but overlooked in correcting; the other was entirely overlooked in reading proof. But Albany is evidently in need of a school house also; and when she gets it perhaps we will not find any more orthography in the Democrat like the following: "Satisfy," "uggles," etc. We have asked no apology from the people of Albany, and accept the explanation given in both the Albany papers as satisfactory. When we wrote our article we believed our information correct, but we are heartily glad to learn that it was not.

THE CODE OF BLOOD.

It now turns out that Borden was innocent in the murder of the innocent. A New York Times article has been expected, that Mary Butler, whose alleged confession of seduction by Rev. J. Lane Borden, in Louisiana, led to his being shot by Rev. Ben. Jenkins and his brother, for they both shot at him, now denies that Borden was guilty of the offense for which he was murdered. The girl's mother joins in the denial, and her story is as follows:

I hereby deny having made at any time a confession to Benjamin J. Jenkins, Jr., to the effect that Mr. Borden had in any manner violated me only so far as a child is concerned. When asked by Mr. Jenkins if Mr. Borden had seduced me, I told him yes. He then asked me in what way. I told him, "I can't tell you, but you can think any way you wish." The only indignity ever offered by Mr. Borden to me was in the library about ten days ago, when I was there for some books which he approached me and attempted to put his hand upon me, and I immediately left the room and was never in his presence again since that time. This treatment of Mr. Borden to me was never mentioned to any one but my mother.

If this is true, and it is not improbable, the young woman seems to have acted with more discretion toward Mr. Borden than toward her lover. The upshot of the whole matter is that a man has been foolishly murdered upon the vague gossip of a thoughtless girl, her good name is exposed to scandal, and a black shadow is thrown over several lives and families. Moreover this is the regular rule and result of every case of resort to blood to protect the honor of women. In the case of Thomas and Davis in Kentucky and in the Sitten case in the Carolinas the probabilities are clearly in favor of the innocence of the women, as of the parties slain. The shot-gun and revolver have often victims than those whose lives are taken. They make murderers of the men who carry them and scream to the world the sacred name of life of the women of the resort to them. A dispatch from Mansfield says that "Jenkins was suffering from hallucination of mind when he fired the fatal shot. But the examination has destroyed this defense by showing that the brother, Neil Jenkins, also took part in the shooting. The local judge and superior court seem to take unusual interest in the case, and if Rev. Ben. Jenkins could get hanged by the due process of law, this disposal of him would prove a more powerful and effective sermon to the faith youth than he is ever likely to deliver from the pulpit."
