To sit, as did a Planet reporter a few days ago, in a very atmosphere of sweet harmony, created by Dr. Verrinder's magic-like touch was an experience that might well be envied, and was calculated to cause the most sensitive nerves to melt away in sentimental reveries. But sentimental moods finally vanish and leave one facing the sober and practical side of life. The music ceased and the conversation of the reporter took the real object of the reporter's call.
