





Question Box. What is "standard butter?" That containing 80 per cent butter fat. That containing 80 per cent butter fat. Only an expert using a sponge will get the moisture below 10 per cent. An at-tempt to work it below that per cent will result in spotling the grain. As a rule butter contains from 12 to 20 per cent moisture. Perhaps an average would be 15 per cent; the other 5 per cent is foreign matter—salt, casein, but-termilk, etc. These foreign elements cause rancidity and the butter to go to the bad. The more of this foreign ele-ment remains in butter the shorter the journey to the bad.
