We find that in all varieties the whole potato produces a greater number and more vigorous stalks than either the halves, quarters or single eyes, and that the general rule is a gradual diminution of the number and vigor of the stalks as the size of the pieces planted diminishes until we reach those cut to one eye in each piece, when we find that the num-ber of the stalks is materially increased. Of those cut to single eyes nearly all ger-minated. We further find that the increat d yield is not in proportion to the increase of the number of stalks. From these facts we infer that in the preparation and planting of the seed to secure the best results the potato should be so cut as to secure one strong, vigorous stalk from each piece and planted so as to secure from three to four stalks to each hill.

On the Country Road. New England Farmer advises, in addition to the regular crops grown, that you sow peas and oats and stop buying bran and cotton seed.

The Massachusetts Plowman says that peas and oats sown together make excel-lent fodder to feed green. They also are among the best of crops for winter feed-

When preparing the ground for pota-toes, see that you have the soil fine and mellow down where the seed goes.


