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HORSE HINTS.

When your horse is heated from riding, do not let him stand in a stable. Take him to a place until the horse cools, and then let him stand in a stable. A small change for the work horses these days can't be made at night will be a goldmine.

Low mangos are best for horses. Be particular about the ventilation in the stable. Keep the air pure without drafts and keep it scrupulously clean. It does not seem possible that a man with common sense would couple a horse to stand in a stable cleaned only once a week, but such cases are too frequent.

October is precisely the month for forcing along all fattening stock. The wastes of the farm are fit for feeding out, and with good, sound grain they should keep the animal with a good appetite and good digestion, and everything should be done to keep the animal in the best of health.

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
