### MACERS EXECUTED.

Ray Sink was murdered September 13, 1898 and thrown into the river below the steel bridge at Salem. As soon as the body was found circum stantial evidence began to point to W. G. Magers as the guilty party. He was arrested and brought to trial and such a complete and strong chain of circumstantial evidence was weren around him that an impartial jury could not do otherwise than prono him guilty. The case was appealed to the supreme court and a new trial was ordered. Last May the case again came up before Judge Burnett in the court here and he was again convicted and has ever since been in the Polk chopping cordwood for C. McCaleb. county jail. The supreme court was ed to in vain for another hearing and his attorneys and friends have brought to bear upon the governor possible influence in his behalf.
