





pint of crude carbolic acid to a bushel of the fine lime, being careful to inti mately mix the two substances. Crude carbolic acid can be purchased at a cost of about 50 cents a gallon and is as good as the refined article for the

purpose. Twice a week scatter the air slaked lime and carbolic acid, after mixing, over the walls, floors, under the roosts, in the nests and over the vards. First scatter it over the yards Spade or plow them and then broadcast it over the surface again. How to Clean Ivory.

Piano keys and ivory knife handles should be cleaned with alcohol. Twice a week rub the keys of a piano with a clean cloth wet with alcohol, and they will always look well. A solution of two-thirds alcohol and one-third sweet oil will take ink stains from wood, but if they are fresh stains and not large it is well before trying the above racipe to take a soft cloth, breathe upon the stain, rub gently while the spot is damp, and it will rab out without any trouble.

How to Make Milk Soup.

Milk soup is very useful when there is no stock to convert into soup and the fish course is not to be boiled. Take a quart of milk and boil it slowly with an onion and a blade of mace. Rub an egg into two onnees of flour until it is in fine crumbs and then stir slowly into boiling milk. Season with pepper and salt.
