Several plum and peach trees in town are in full bloom. Business is improving and everyone seems to be happy.

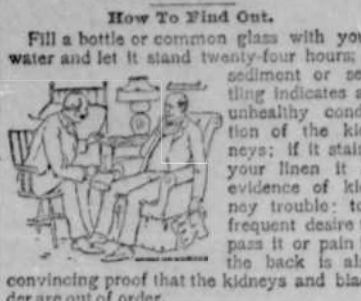
Wm. Percival drove a band of sheep through town Tuesday. Mr. Stark has his hotel furnished with new window shades.
