UNION CONVENTION.

Last Saturday's political gathering drew a large crowd from all over the county. Promptly at 10 o'clock J. E. Shibley, chairman of the central committee, called the convention to order and M. E. Ellis was chosen as presiding officer with W. A. Wann and E. B. Johnson as clerks.
Committees were appointed as follows: Credentials, Cass Riggs, Jas. Craven, W. E. Williams, C. C. Gardner, H. L. Crider; permanent organization and order of business, D. W. Sears, G. N. Townsend, T. W. Brunk, W. E. Conner, J. D. Smith; platform, J. W. Kirkland, J. D. Holmes, J. O. Staats, T. S. Burch and N. F. Gregg. Then the meeting adjourned until 1 o'clock.
The afternoon session was called to order at 1:30 by Chairman Ellis.

The committee on permanent organization and order of business recommended that the temporary officers be made permanent and the order of business be as given in this report, and the same was adopted.
On recommendation the state platform as published in the Organian recently was adopted.
Judge Hayden then offered some resolutions, which created an animated

discussion, but on motion they were read and passed on. The one relating to the payment of Indian war veterans was unanimously adopted, and so was that favoring the adoption of a law restricting coolie and other illiterate foreign immigration. The one criticizing the democratic central committee for naming the delegates to the state convention was ruled out of order, and that relating to normal schools and certain other things was laid on the table.
The next thing in order being the election of a state senator, Ezra Conner, E. V. Dalton, J. M. Grant, and G. N. Townsend were appointed tellers and nominations were in order. N. F. Gregg, David J. Holmes and Jesse B. Stump were nominated, but Mr. Stump declined to run. As there were 120 delegates, it took 61 to elect, and the vote stood: Gregg 98, Holmes 16, Butler 2, blank 2. In a few witty remarks Mr. Homes moved to make the nomination unanimous, which was done.
Joseph Craven was made the nominee for representative by acclamation.
In recognition of his loyal services to the county under extraordinary difficulties J. G. Van Ordel had no opposition for and was renominated amid a tumult of acclamation.
The hardest fight of the afternoon was for the clerkship, but Tracy Staats finally came out on top against Rice Hastings, J. W. Lewis and Asa Robertson. Lee Penton was nominated, but he declined to run. First ballot—Hastings 18, Staats 39, Lewis 34, Robertson 29. Second ballot—Hastings 12, Staats 43, Lewis 38, Robertson 27. Third ballot, Hastings withdrawn—Staats 50, Lewis 36, Robertson 32. Fourth ballot, Robinson withdrawn—Staats 67, Lewis 50.
J. E. Shibley being the only nominee for county judge, he was unanimously made the candidate of the party.
For county commissioner J. L. Stockton and James McDowell were nominated, the first named getting 45 votes and the last 73.
Only one vote was necessary to secure a candidate for treasurer, E. V. Dalton taking it with 66 votes against J. D. Bell's 35 and N. Gardner's 16.
Five candidates bobbed up for assessor—J. C. Cochran, F. E. Myer, Wilson Putnam, A. L. Porter, and E. W. Purvine, the vote resulting: Cochran 28, Purvine 21. On the second ballot the rest withdrew and left the race to Myer and Porter. Result—Myer 73, Porter 47.
For school superintendent William Parker was chosen and it seemed to be the unanimous opinion that about the first of July he would begin to hold down that office for the next four years.
Dr. W. S. Carey was nominated by acclamation for coroner and Luther Ground for surveyor.
