CONVENTION.

The eighth annual gathering of the

Polk county Sunday school association occurred at the M. E. church, south, in Dallas, Friday, June 8th, Mrs. W. A. Wash presiding and Mrs. Bonnie Smith secretary. Harvey Boals, Mrs. Phillips and Mrs. Escher were made a committee on nominations. Rev. C. G. Harmon, M. M. Jones and Mrs. Seward on enrollment. Rev. A. I. Goodfriend, Rev. G. A. McKinley and W. E. Goodell on resolutions. Before adjournment Rev. A. I. Goodfriend gave a practical illustration of how to teach a class. The afternoon session was opened by songs led by Mrs. Chase. Scripture reading by Rev. McKinley and prayer by Rev. Harmon. The enrollment showed delegates from Zena, Oak Grove, Rickreall, Monmouth, Lewisville, Montgomery and Dallas. The report of statistical secretary Mrs. Escher made a rather poor showing of the work actually done on account of the negligence of Sunday school workers in reporting. Only \$8.72 was reported as having been collected for county and state work. Mr. Edmunds gave an interesting and helpful talk on county organization, showing its importance in carrying on systematic and thorough work. By an illustrated blackboard talk Mrs. Edmunds told and showed how to teach a primary class. She placed great stress on the subject of lessons, gradually leading the child from the known to the unknown. The subsequent discussion and questions propounded showed a keen interest among those present. Mr. Edmunds told how to build up a Sunday school and several discussed the question. Upon recommendation of the nominating committee these officers were chosen for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. W. A. Wash; vice president, M. M. Jones; secretary and treasurer, Mrs. Bonnie Smith; statistical secretary, Mrs. A. Escher; executive committee, resident pastors of Dallas churches, M. M. Jones, Mrs. M. J. Bronson, Mrs. W. A. Wash and perhaps other delegates will attend the state convention in Portland this fall. The committee on resolutions reported as follows and they were adopted: That we extend a vote of thanks to the E. church, south, for the use of their building.
