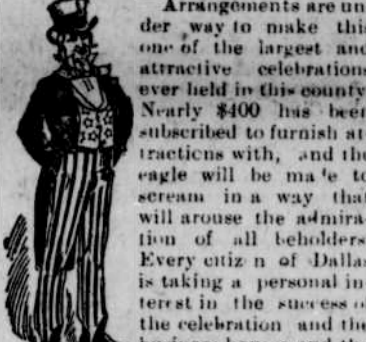

A BLAZE OF GLORY Unprecedented in the History of Polk County, is a Tame Expression to Denote Way in Which Dallas is Going to Celebrate the Anniversary of Uncle Sam's Birth.



Arrangements are under way to make this one of the largest and attractive celebrations ever held in this county. Nearly \$400 has been subscribed to furnish attractions with, and the eagle will be made to ascend in a way that will arouse the admiration of all beholders.

Residences will be superbly and lavishly decorated. The procession will form at 10 o'clock under the marshaling of John F. Groves, with T. J. Graves and J. E. Hubbard as aids. The Dallas Zouave band will head the procession, followed by the two militia companies from Salem and Woodburn.



The float feature of the parade is to be generally patronized, these having signified their intention to display their business artistically: Hope—E. C. Kirkpatrick. Lumber—Thurston Lumber Co. As the interest increases others will join in, and it is said that several Salem merchants intend to take advantage of the occasion to show the Polk county people their stock in trade.

The library car will be as beautiful as an energetic committee can make it and the Goddess of Liberty. Miss Namie Starr, will be a vision of beauty wondrous fair to look upon.

The line of march has not yet been determined, but will be long enough to give all a chance to see it in good shape. M. M. Ellis will be president of the day, and when they get to the camp ground W. I. Reynolds will read the Declaration of Independence and N. L. Butler will deliver the oration.

On the afternoon of the 3rd Company F, of Salem, and Company L, of Woodburn, will arrive in Dallas and camp in the city park, each company bringing 40 men, fully equipped for drill and warfare. Immediately after dinner on the seminary campus they will give an exhibition drill and then a sham battle. This will be the great attraction of the day, never before seen in Polk county, and a sight which no one can afford to miss.

The other afternoon sports will be: Base ball game, Albany vs. Dallas, for a prize of \$30. Tug of war, for which the Dallas Woodmen camp team under the captaincy of Dr. Hayter has challenged any other camp or fraternal order, a box of cigars by Druggist M. D. Ellis.
