The tactics used by the republican party four years ago in almost forcibly persuading laboring men that if a democrat was made president the country would go to the dogs and they lose their jobs, is being tried again. Trusts and corporations that have grown rich under the special protection of the present administration have thousands of employees to whom they will presume to dictate as to how they shall vote, under penalty of loss of position. Some of them will be constrained to vote for the opposite of their convictions, but a far greater number will vote as they think best.

The republican press throughout the land is just now making desperate efforts to show that multitudes are deserting Bryan for McKinley, but somehow they never hear of or fail to report the republicans who will not swallow McKinley. Those who are closely watching the actual political movements and prospects in all parts of the union agree that Mr. McKinley is by no means having a walk over in the race. If there ever was a time when democrats were justified in deserting their party, it is not so now. Let others do as they may, but if you believe in democratic principles be sure to support Mr. Bryan, who is both capable and worthy.

H. A. Baldwin and wife, of Winlock, Washington, old residents of this place, have a new baby boy.

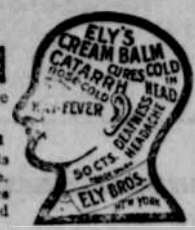
There will be a special school meeting at the school house Saturday for the purpose of voting a tax to erect the school room.
