This is said to cure scarlet fever and smallpox: Sulphate of zinc, one grain; digitalis, one grain; sugar one half spoonful. Dissolve in a wine glass of soft water or water that has been boiled and cooled. Take a tea spoonful every hour. Either scarlet fever or smallpox will disappear in twelve hours. For children the dose must be diminished according to age.

He has 100 of these upon his place, which have proved a valuable commercial article. Their wool is long, fleecy and fine almost as silk, and it costs nothing to raise them as they feed upon grass, weeds and things that no other animal would eat.
