The California Groves of Sequoia Fast Falling Before the Ax.

As we know it now the redwood Sequoia sempervirens) lives only in a sarrow strip of the coast ranges 10 to 30 miles wide, extending from just within the southern border of Oregon to the bay of Monterey, while the big tree (Sequola washingtoniana) is found only in small groves scattered along the rest slope of the Sierra Nevada mounains, from the middle fork of the American river to the head of Deer reek, a distance of 260 miles. The ut most search reveals but ten main roups, and the total number of sizthe trees in these groups must be limted to figures in the thousands. It is, noreover. the plain truth that all the specimens which are remarkable for heir size do not exceed 500,

The big trees are unique in the world -the grandest, the largest, the oldest, ost unjestically graceful of trees -and, if it were not enough to be all this, they are among the scarcest of known free species and have the extreme scientific value of being the best iving representatives of a former geologic age. Profit In Growing Celery With Mulch and Irrigation.

One of my main money crops is cel-ery. This I grow by a method very most prominent part of the animal.similar to the one which has been called the "newest celery culture," says W. H. Jenkins in Farm and Fireside. The celery was planted on very rich ground in rows, with alternate spaces between them of 12 and 18 inches. After the celery had grown a few inches

CELERY NEARLY THREE FRET HIGH. high a mulch of manure was placed in the 18 inch space, and the blanching boards were set up when the celery was about one foot high, so that the rows that were 12 inches apart were between the boards, thus boarding two rows together, but keeping the boards apart, so they would not cover the plants until they had grown above the boards, which were about 18 inches wide. The field of celery was irrigated by pouring the water on the mulch of manure between the rows with the hose. The plants on a part of the field

such goods, and the price is not questioned. Because of lack of help to do the work a small portion of the field was not mulched and irrigated, and, the season being very dry, the celery made so small a growth that it was hardly marketable at any price. The only difference in the culture was in the mulching and irrigation. This cost about \$35 an acre, and by expending this additional amount a field of celery was made to pay a good profit that would not have paid the expense of growing without the mulching and irrigation

Cauliflowers I have always found in good demand and at remunerative prices. The market is not generally verstocked because few people under take to grow them for market, think-ing their culture is too difficult. I have ound nothing very difficult in their culture. I give them almost the same reatment as cabbages, except when the plants are about half grown I place a mulch of manure between the rows and then irrigate them in the same way as the celery, and this generally insures the crop. If a drought should ome when the plants are heading, the crop would be uncertain, but the mulching and irrigation prevent their suffering for lack of moisture at this time and make the crop a profitable one.



Heavy snow should be allowed to re-main about the hives just as it fell, even if it covers the bives entirely. It is important to have an alighting place convenient for the bees to enter the


