SINCE the capture of Aguinaldo the prospects of peace and quiet in the Philippines have decidedly brightened. Many important rebel officers with their commands have surrendered and the insurgents generally have become less bold and hopeful. The national authorities no longer think it necessary to raise as powerful an army as the president was authorized to call out. As rapidly as may be the military authorities will be superseded by the civil ones.

INTERNATIONAL affairs in China seem no nearer a solution than months ago. Russia would compel China to come to her terms were it not for the combined opposition of the other powers. One of the most difficult problems to solve will be the amount of indemnity each nation shall receive. Our government insists that the aggregate claims shall not be beyond the ability of that country to pay, but some of the European countries are inclined to demand twice that amount. America seems to be the balance wheel to keep the whole matter within reasonable limits.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY and his cabinet are now making a triumphal tour of the country, having left Washington on a superb special train last Monday. Multitudes flocked to greet them at every stopping place and at every station passed day or night crowds were assembled. Today they are enjoying unbounded Southern hospitality in New Orleans and next week California will receive them on a grand scale. They will journey in and around San Francisco for a week and then come north through our state and the Sound country. A brief stop will be made in Salem and a longer one in Portland. They have regular cabinet meetings on board and are kept constantly informed by wire of governmental affairs, the same as if they were in their offices at Washington.

AMONG the interesting places we visited in San Francisco recently was the mint, it being the largest in the union. There are three others, one each at Philadelphia, New Orleans and Carson City. We saw the whole process of making money, beginning with the gold as it comes from the mines. They were coining twenty dollar pieces, which were rolling out like a stream of grain from a hopper. A large force is employed, the finishing touches being given by ladies. Every process is so closely watched that it would be almost impossible to take any of the precious metal without being detected. Besides millions in gold there are \$65,000,000 of silver stored in the vaults of the mint. An interesting old man showed us all through the building and explained everything.

Evangelist Ross, who is well known here, is building a new home at Los Angeles.
Falls City never before had such bright prospects. Their river is to be made navigable for logs and lumber and they fully expect a railroad to either Dallas or Independence. Then several saw mill plants and other industries would be established there.

"There lives near my home," said a resident of Rockland, Me., recently, "a man named Edwin McIntyre, who leads a hermit life and has a queer hobby. One of the prettiest and best kept pieces of road in Maine passes in front of his lonely retreat. If the school board fail to cause its use in the schools, they lose a certain per cent of their school money. This course of study requires certain attainments for promotion. Many of our pupils have dropped out of school, and they, losing three months of the best part of the year, will necessarily be compelled to go over the work again. A pupil who has only done fair work cannot possibly go on. Parents, you are making a mistake if you allow your boy or girl to drop out unless you wish them to remain a year longer in their grade.
