LOCAL NEWSPAPERS.

THEIR TRUE POSITION IN THE COMMUNITY.

Complex Services Which They Should Perform—Their Value as Public Institutions—Useful as Promoters of Business.

The rightly conducted local newspaper contributes more to the well being of its community than any other private enterprise and is second in importance to the people to no public institution unless it be the public school, writes E. P. Harrison in Newspaperdom.

Much of a trivial nature may appear in the local paper, but the fact remains that the local news, in the broadest sense, is the solvent which binds the varying elements of local life into an organic whole. To the vast majority of people local things are more important than the doings of the state and nation. Next to the family, the most important unit is the local community. The local newspaper that records all of the local happenings, tendencies and developments that are of interest to the people has performed a very important service. If, in addition to this, the editor construes and comments on the more important matters in a way to reflect the best sentiments of the people, he contributes a factor to local life the value of which cannot be over-estimated.

The editor still further places the town under obligations to him if, from study of the life and doings of other communities, he is able to make suggestions for the local welfare.

The local paper should reflect local citizenship. The reader is more interested to know what is going on in his own town than in any other. Local questions tend to know what one editor thinks. Local opinions are interesting local news. The editor who has the ability and is in touch with the community so as to conduct a paper on these lines has a hold upon the people which not only gives him an honorable and dignified position, but should, with good business management, make him an adequate income and a valuable property.

Almost as important to the community and more important to the treasury is the management of that part of the paper which is paid for by the author—namely, the advertising. It should be borne in mind that advertising today is not an optional matter, but the only means by which goods can be distributed to the best advantage of buyers and the greatest profit to the merchant. It is an improved merchandising machine that enables the buyer to get what he wants at least trouble and expense; for the dealer to do a much larger business with a given plant to his advantage and profit.

While the space occupied by the advertiser is paid for by the merchant, it is the privilege and duty of the editor to make the matter as interesting and valuable as possible to the reader. A useful suggestion in the advertising columns adds as much to the attractiveness of the paper to the reader as though it appeared in the news columns.

It can almost be laid down as a rule that the more fresh, interesting and helpful the advertising columns are made to the reader, the more benefit the advertiser will derive from the paper and the more he will pay for the use of the paper.

Success in conducting a local paper depends, first, upon the right conception of the highest utility of the paper. With this view of the office of the local paper there will be no seeking of temporary sensations, no deceiving headlines, for the newspaper man will realize that the value of his paper to reader and advertiser alike rests on confidence.

There will be no begging of advertising "to help the paper," for the attitude of soliciting advertising for the profit of the advertiser will be recognized as the more effective as well as the more dignified.

In short, a conception of the true position of the local newspaper will place its conductor in the social position he should occupy and his bank balance on a footing of independence.

CAUSE AND EFFECT.

Pelch Cautions Breeders to Not Make the Former For the Latter.

There are a few things in poultry culture which breeders will do well to consider. Whatever the cause of a trouble, the effect once apparent, it is folly to use the affected specimens, for by so doing you establish a defect hard to eradicate. One thing is certain, a male that is weak in procreative vigor will surely indicate the same by diminutive embellishments known as male characteristics. Thus a Light Brahma cock, narrow in skull, with small ear lobes and wattle diminutive or absent, is never a sure getter. The procreative germs will be deficient or weak, and his appearance as described above will surely indicate this lack of vigor. The female, on the other hand, may have these features of comb, ear lobes and wattle very small indeed, yet lay very large eggs. The Light Brahma hens, which in many instances lay eggs to weigh 37 ounces to the dozen, have these head embellishments very small. So while vent of procreative power in the male shows its effect in the diminutive appearance we cannot say that small combs are the cause or will in the hens denote that they will lay very small eggs, for there are other things, such as excessive blocky shape, superabundance of plumage, multiplicity of small incisors and deteriorated size, all of which will affect egg production, making the eggs fall in size, become uneven in shape and far less in number.

Procreation is the work of the male. The hen furnishes the nourishment for the germ during incubation, and the hen is far more responsible for the size of her progeny than is the male, for if her nourishment of the germ is meager and lacking, the development and size of the germ will receive a check which can never be entirely overcome in after life.

It is true of all breeds that the females are smaller and that their combs, ear lobes and wattles are smaller and weaker than those of the males. It is true of that which in the male is substance. Hackles, saddle hangers and sickles are exclusive male characteristics, and when any of these features are lacking or have not a generous development they are the effect and sign of a low state of procreative power. When a breed (if care not what the breed assumes blockiness as a feature in an extreme form, the hens are never as good layers, either in size or number of eggs, as those individuals which have the shape favoring what we call

the "erect tree stock." In southern states, where irrigation is necessary, trees are affected by a disease which attacks the roots. smooth. The cochin shaped, heavy plumed Brahma, the short bodied Plymouth Rock, the pigeon breasted, excessively blocky Wyandotte, all lay small eggs and fewer of them than the larger framed, oblong sisters of their kindred. Thus do we see that shape easily affects fecundity, just as the different shaped cells of the bee produce the queens or the workers.

And one of the breeds that have suffered most in this respect has been the Wyandotte, both at the hands of judges who force the winners into this squat, wide bodied shape which is at variance with egg production and because of ancestral influences of the Schlicht Rantam, White Hamburg, Rose Comb Leghorn, Buff Cochin, Dark Brahma and Albino Plymouth Rock. A multiplicity of short bodied, small egg races, coupled with the insane demand of the judges for wide bodies, has made it a hard matter for ordinary breeders to satisfy patrons that fowls of this race are producers of first class eggs, while if they would breed the males only with generously furnished pendulous ear lobes and wattles and females with long formation of body and set only eggs of more to the dozen they would have no trouble to raise Wyandottes to weigh in excess of present standard demand. These birds can be a reasonable exponent of the standard. All the judge has to do to make them so is to throw himself upon the side of purity in its most productive form and punish extra shortness the same as he would excessive length of body, thus giving the medium shaped birds the prizes. Then after three generations of this course the breeder would no longer have to make apologies for their egg production, either for size, shape or color.—L. K. Felch in Farm Journal.
