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Oregon Crops.

The past week, although averaging about 5 degrees warmer than the previous one, was still slightly cooler than usual at this season of the year.

Temperature ranged from 40 to 88 in this valley, and in Eastern Oregon from 92 to 88. There were numerous small showers, but the week closed dry.

Elevated regions had frost on the 4th. Haying is well on, being extra heavy in this valley, but somewhat light elsewhere.

Pasturage is reported short in Coos county, but good elsewhere. Fall grain is extra good here, but is not filling well in Eastern Oregon.

Historic Building.

In about 1857 Jas. Riggs was keeping store in the corner building where Frank Stiles now has a harness shop.

A little south of it is erected a building in which Mr. and Mrs. John Robb, now Mrs. Emmons, kept a hotel for several years.

Morris Jones, who is still around Dallas, was assistant cook and waited on the table. After that Mr. McTimmons and still later Thomas Hulcomb kept hotel there.

Later on it was used as a dwelling by Wash Riggs and others and then Jim Garrison made wagons and fanning mills in it. Frank Brown then used it as a wagon and repair shop, after which it was used for a Chinese wash house, and finally came to be a blacksmith shop.

C. G. Rowell being the last occupant. For several years it has belonged to T. J. Cherrington, the photographer. The ancient structure has just been torn down and the ground leased for a term of ten years to A. W. Dockstader, who is having moved there the heavy stable which was built south of the court house by H. M. Brown. That location belongs to the county and was leased to Mr. Brown for an indefinite time. The barn was ordered removed because of danger to the jail in case of fire.

MONTGOMERY & MILLIGAN'S

Go one mile south from Falls City up a rather steep grade and you will find a hive of industry. During the early spring the above named firm established there a new saw mill near the site of the old Montgomery mill.

They have gradually added to it and improved the machinery until now it turns out daily a large amount of good lumber. But little of it is shipped away for the simple reason that the farmers for miles around come and take it away nearly as fast as it leaves the saw. The bulk of it is being used for building fences and barns, although considerable home building and repairing is being done. Several families live around the mill and the boarders are kept by Mrs. J. I. Montgomery and Mrs. F. K. Hubbard. In various capacities more than thirty men are employed in connection with the plant. Frank Meyer and Elmer James furnish steam power, while C. J. Pugh presides at the saw. Fred Raymond and E. F. Turner have sole charge of the planing machines and all needed blacksmithing is done by C. H. McSherry. Milton Graham presides at the setzer, while Andy McSherry does the edging and Heston McSherry attends to the off bearing. A. C. James has supervision over the dry kiln and Ernest McSherry attends to tying the dressed and seasoned lumber into bundles. J. I. Montgomery keeps track of the whole concern, Wm. Mulligan is yard boss and R. R. Davenport is their bookkeeper. John Thomas and Elmer Lewis are lumber rustlers in the yard. Southard Talbot and Earl Raymond assist a cund the planer, the edger off bearers being A. I. Reed and F. P. Farrington, while Clark Travis and Arthur Montgomery help around the dry kiln. John Bashor attends to the trimming. Allie Kimball does the hauling and Warren Graham is outside salesman. The season's run to date has been about a million feet and there are prospective orders enough to take all they can cut during the summer and fall. A. I. Brown and Arthur Vassell assisted by H. M. Brown, do the logging. Within a mile of the mill are several million feet of saw timber, all of which can be drawn on a down grade to the plant. It is at the edge of the road leading to the Rock creek and Siletz country and people are continually passing each way. Should the proposed railroad be built they would come to easily get their output to it. Excellent water comes from a mountain spring not far away. People from the valley could go and spend one or several days there very pleasantly. We interviewed John Murphy at a mountain home near there and learned that within the last year he had made over 30,000 shanks. He has formed a life partnership with his neighbor, the widow Jarvis, the change being best for both of them.
