BUENA VISTA. James Tetherow has rented his farming land to H. Martin.

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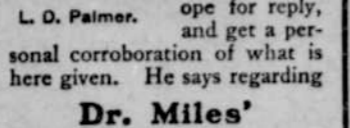
BUENA VISTA. We have a flour mill but no miller at present.
