BEYOND BETHEL HILLS.

About 9 o'clock on a recent Tuesday morning the writer drove past the Oak Grove church, grange hall and school house. The hop fields of E. L. Harris, Otto Hanson and A. Heise looked as though they had just yielded up a rich harvest and Mr. Hansen's hops were being baled in a superior manner. A Mr. Simons lives on the old George Eilers place, the home of Gus Larsen being across the road a little this way. S. W. Fletcher lives on the E. T. Hatch place and J. I. Ball runs the Fletcher farm. Mrs. G. C. Bell and her son, Ed., are still at their long time home. Most of their children having married and scattered. J. P. Krummet and wife have rented the old home to L. A. Williamson and moved to Salem. Just over the hill lives George Kelly on the west and Henry Alexander on the east side of the road. Near the Bethel cemetery, which has been so much improved in late years, we turned in at a gate and were soon enjoying the noontime hospitality of P. C. Sears and family. In all the country passed over plows and seeders were running and more than former amount of stock were seen in the pastures. Clover, rape and other stock feeds are evidently taking the place of so much grain in the past. In some orchards the fruit has been gathered and in others it was going to waste. Besides a good place there Mr. Sears has near Sheridan another farm where he spends much of his time. The Bethel fruit dryer not being in operation some crops had been sold and hauled away. E. N. Smith has charge of Bethel academy and as he has been popular as a teacher elsewhere he will doubtless win a good name there. Rev. I. N. Mulkey lives near the academy and so do I. P. Reese and Mrs. Denny. C. L. Hawley lives on his father's place. About a year ago J. H. Hawley brought from Wisconsin about 40 Lincolnshire sheep at a cost of almost \$1000. sons finishing up their prune drying, they having eight tons of Italians and half as many Petites. They will soon move to Silverton where Prof. Crawford is principal of the public school. Frank Purvine is farming the place. Passing the church and cemetery we stopped to interview J. R. Shepard. He had just finished curing 25,000 pounds of Italian and 8,000 of Petite prunes, all first class. He will dry about a ton of apples and pears. Within a month he had sold \$500 worth of prunes. He has 50 pigs getting ready for market next summer. His hogs have had but little to eat except waste fruit, rape and clover pasture and plenty of field peas. He is an earnest believer in such peas and rape for stock feed. He bought several meadows and haled 100 tons of timothy hay which he is now selling in Salem at \$10 a ton. On the old Walling place we found F. W. Peaslee who married a Miss Walling, and W. O. Cooper is running the J. N. Skafie farm. The Wm. Walker house is vacant, but Mrs. Walker and Mrs. Dora came over from Salem and spent part of the summer. D. G. Henry has just finished one of the finest houses in the county, it being on the site of the old one. It has all modern conveniences within and is attractive without. Mr. Kuser, of Rickwall, and Mr. Schroeder, of Dallas, did most of the carpenter work and H. P. Shriver from here painted it. After a short chat with Mrs. Winslow near Bush college we climbed a mountain, passed the homes of Bruce and Dorr Gibson and came out at the home of J. W. McDowell near Popcorn school house. It was now 4 o'clock and dark caught us before we got home. Many signs of industry and progress were seen all around and nearly all lands were in a good humor with themselves and the world. Except in a few places the roads were excellent. This is but an inkling of what we saw and heard, lack of space forbidding more extended remarks.
