Railroad Prospects.

It begins to look like we were going to have a sure enough railroad to Falls City. L. Gerlinger, of Portland, is at the head of the project and has substantial timber interests beyond Falls City. A crew of eight men began last Monday a preliminary survey starting from near the public school. J. W. Covert is chief engineer, John Van Ordel, transitman, Jas. Hartly, stakeholder, Bruce Burnett and Kirt Tennis, chainmen, Wes. Craven, axeman, Luther Johnson, rodman and John McDonnell, flagman. Mr. Covert says that while their charter calls for a connection with the Willamette river and Salem,

they will not for the present extend the road in that direction. Long distance lumber shipments from Dallas would cost the same as from any other places in western Oregon.
