### COUNCIL MEETING.

The representatives of this city's voters were called to order Monday evening by Councilman-at-large Hayter.

Present—Hayter, Fiske, Muir, Cooper, Vassall, Riggs, street commissioner and marshal.

Absent—Grant, auditor and mayor. The finance committee reported the treasurer's report as correct and his bill was allowed.

These other claims were also allowed: F. H. Muscott, hauling \$ 5 65 M. D. Ellis, lights 102 75 J. M. Grant, salary 21 00 J. J. Williams, street work 5 50 Jas. Robinson, gravel 5 10

A petition, signed by 66 taxpayers, was presented, asking the city to buy the electric light plant of M. D. Ellis. On motion of Muir the petition was given back to the presenter to secure more signatures, it being the sense of the council that it should not be acted upon unless signed by a good majority of the voters of the town.

R. Koehler asked a two weeks' postponement in regard to the railroad's proposed sidewalk on Clay street and on motion of Vassall the same was granted.

On motion of Fiske Oscar Hayter was hired as the city's legal adviser for one year, and a resolution was adopted fixing his salary at \$50 per annum and prescribing his duties.

On motion of Riggs the auditor was instructed to notify M. D. Ellis that the council desire him to give morning service on the arc light system for the same money now paid, and in the event that this request is not granted that it is the sense of this council that the price for each arc light be reduced from \$7.50 to \$6.50.

The street committee reported that some of the sidewalk lately ordered had not been built, and that some had not built there as ordered by the street commissioner. On motion of Vassall the sidewalks built by Mrs. Conkey, Mrs. James, David Cooper, David Riley and Mr. Cudler were accepted and the liens against the property discharged. The auditor was instructed to advertise for bids for the building of the sidewalks along the Harris and Hotel Holman properties, and the street commissioner was instructed to place on the proper lines the sidewalks of Eakin, VanOrsdell, Dunn and Smith.

On motion of Fiske the street commissioner was instructed to find the west line of the Conkey claim and to locate therefrom the permanent lines of Shelton street, to employ a surveyor and to act in conjunction with the property holders.

By a unanimous vote resolution No. 4 was rescinded, it being virtually the same as No. 1.

Muir adjourned.

RAILROAD TO FALLS CITY. At a Board of Trade meeting Tuesday evening, L. Gerlinger, through his chief engineer, J. H. Coover, made our people a proposition to this effect: For a subsidy of \$10,000, not to be paid until the road is in running order, he will build between here and Falls City and beyond, a standard gauge rail road to be operated continuously. Saw logs would be delivered as cheap in Dallas as to Falls City and \$2 cheaper than they could be bought in Portland. The proposition was accepted and a finance committee was appointed to attend to the details. It would be principally a logging road and would in time be extended to the Willamette river and on west to the ocean. Millions of feet of superior timber would be tributary to the road.
