When to Sprend Manure, Whether or no to spread manure in winter depends very much upon the that the leachings from the manure will run off into a ditch or gully, the manure will probably not be much more valuable than ordinary soil, says C. V. Gregory in American Agriculturist. On level land, however, there is no better time to baul manure than during the winter. What does it matter if the fertilizer elements are leached out? The leachings run down into the soll and are available for plant food scener than if manure is spread n the fall and immediately plowed under. A wideawake, bustling farmer does not wait for the rush of spring work to do all his hauling. At that time his yards should all be cleaned up in good shape.

Dried Blood For Calves. For two years the Kansas experiment station has been experimenting with dried blood for a calf toule and food. Several tests have been made. and the station is convinced that dried subject to scours. In feeding dried blood a teaspoonful in each teed of milk is sufficient. Give this until the calf is strong or until the scours disappear. If a calf is very weak, the allowance may be increased gradually to a tablespoonful at a feed. This dried blood is mixed with the milk and should be fed just as soon as mixed.

Point For the Hog. There is one point in favor of the log which is not always placed to its credit and that is, unlike the horse, cow or sheep, it produces a number of young at one birth, says a Wisconsin correspondent of Prairie Farmer. This fact enables those who make hog raising a specialty to rapidly increase such stock and cheapens the cost of production by reducing the number of sources from which the increase is derived. Taking this into consideration and also that the hog will eat anything that may be produced upon the farm, he is a more valuable animal than he is credited

Value of Corn Stover. The Maryland experiment station reports that by weighing the ears and stover of corn and analyzing them they found 1,530 pounds of digestible matter in the ears and 1,642 in the stover, or 112 pounds more of food in the stover than in the ear. Probably it was not as rich in percentage of protein as were the ear and grain, but it was certainly too valuable to be wasted, as it often is where the corn shredblood is not only good for a weak calf, der has not come in use. And, by the but is an excellent remedy for a calf way, chemists say the lower part of the stalk is more nutritious than that above the ear.

> Young Pork Popular. The popularity of young pork, with plenty of lean ment on it, has proved a boon to the farmers, for it is far more profitable to raise the first 100 pounds of any animal than the last 100 pounds, says American Cultivator. This is partly due to the fact that nature forces the growth of the young animal rapidly, bones, muscles and flesh all growing so that every ounce of food is almost entirely converted into live weight. There is practically no loss, and all the animal equires is fair attention and good food. Nature is then able and willing to do the rest.

Indigestion in sheep may be avoided by giving linseed oil meal or ground linseed once a day in feeds of four unces to a sheep, and on the first appearance of constipation give half a int of the raw linseed oil. Give every ay a full teaspoonful of ground ginger, gentian and sulphate of iron. Too uch feeding on second growth clover should be avoided, as it will easily enuse such trouble as this.

Drowsiness and Diarrhea In Sheep. Sheep troubled with drowsiness, diar rhea and cough are suffering from indigestion and should be treated this way: Give half a pint of raw linseed oil. After it has operated give bran mash once a day, in which give to a lamb one evel teaspoonful of an even mixture of ground ginger, gentian and sulphate of ron. Continue this for some time. Give twice as much to a sheep.

Cornstalk Disease. Repeated experiments have failed to prove that smut is injurious to cattle. but in our experience we find that where smut is plentiful there is usually present the fungus which gives rise to 'cornstalk disease." For this reason great care should be taken in feeding the stalkfields to cattle. Contagious Ophthalmin, Low, wet places or rivers, etc., are the source of the germ of ophthalmia, Physic the afflicted animals with epsom salts; follow with doses of saltpeter twice daily until well. Adult animals take one pound of salts and tablespoonful of saltpeter at a dose. Calves should have doses according to size. Keep affected eyes covered with soft cloth to be kept constantly wet with a solution of creolin forty dreps, soft water one quart, or 10 per cent solution of boracle acid. If can procure it in time, one of the tar product disinfectants will be found as effective as any other remedy if used in 5 per cent solution.

The Latest In Butter. Vegetaline is a new product prepared from the cocoanut that is being manufactured by a Marseilles firm. It is a kind of butter, which, it is stated, is especially adapted to the uses of bakers and confectioners. The article is harder and whiter than butter, which it only resembles in its fatty nature. It is obtained by refining the oil extract of the dried cocoanut.



DEHORNING CATTLE.

Simple and Efficient Cage For Holding the Animals. In response to inquiry The National Stockman republishes the subjoined de-

scription of a dehorning eage Dimensions, 6 feet long, 6 feet high, feet wide at top in front and 41/2 feet wide at top at back end; bottom or foot board a foot wide, with seven cleats 114 inches thick, a foot long, nailed across it to keep cattle from slipping; footboard 2 inches thick and rests on three 2 by 4 inch crosspleces 4 feet long. To these are bolted upright pieces 7 feet long, 2 by 4 inches, for nailers for sides of cage. Across the top of cage are used two strips 1 by 4 inches for each set of uprights, boited one on each side of upright. The inside of this frame is boarded up with the plank of convenient widths. As soon as the head is fastened a hand spike is slipped through the cage back of the animal and another over the neck to hold the head down. These remain in place usually without holding, the operator standing in front while taking off the horns. The smallest animal having horns up to a bull weighing 1,830 pounds has been deherned in this sized cage. Animals weighing up to 1,200 pounds pass right through the cage when the holding lever is thrown back against the right eral Passenger Agent, Portland Oreside. Proper Coupling of Sheep The coupling of sheep is a subject that in many cases receives too little attention, says W. J. Clarke in Wool Markets and Sheep. To allow a ram tal-to run wild, as it were, with a bunch that not conducive to the raising of the standard of our flocks. Where the ram is allowed to run with the flock during the coupling season he should be given a feed of grain daily. He should also be riddled on the breast back between the fore legs with a mixtree of eil and lampblack. This will show which ewes have been served by him. When served, these should be removed from the main flock and put in a lot or field, and after the course of two weeks another ram, riddled with a mixture of ocher and oil, should be put with them. Any "coming around" will then be served and marked. Where the ram is some-

Silnge For Ewes and Lambs. We have never had a sile. Having alvays a great abundance of alfalfa or ver hay we have not needed it much says Joseph E. Wing in Breeder's Gazette. Yet such shepherds as H. H. Miller and H. P. Miller, both fornous lamb growers, use siles. H. P. Miller leclares good sliage a great aid in keepng up the milk flow of the ewes. There s no doubt that the ewe needs about the same ration as the dairy cow while she is suckling her lamb. I would suggest that the silage be made so as to sweet, fearing that much acidity in it would harm the lambs through the milk. That means that the corn should get fairly mature before being put into
