Advance In Price of Milk. The advance in the price of milk caused by the increase in cost of food must be paid by the consumers, and yet, says American Cultivator, it may not affect them as much as it would have done if there had been a similar Now, what do you think of that? advance in grain prices fifteen or twen ty years ago or more. The rigid in spection of the milk supply compels the milk to be of a fixed standard, and neither farmer, contractor nor retail dealers can safely add much water to it to reduce the cost per gallon without danger of detection. The old joke about "the cow with the wooden tail" making up the deficiency when the others did not produce a full supply has gone out of date, nor can a farmer cut down his grain feed to his cows safely. for "poor bay and no grain" will no keep his milk up to the standard. We sold milk for several years, and we found it profitable to feed grain liber ally, even when the price was high, as it kept our customers, and when other dealers could not supply theirs we re ceived new ones, and if a short supply made it seem proper to raise our pric a little we could always get the in crease. We have even bought more cows at such times from those who thought there was no profit in keeping them when the feed cost so much. In selling milk or making butter we found it most profitable to give about as much grain as the cow could eat and digest without regard to its cost.



The weight of evidence from those who have grown green crops to feed when the pastures run short and have had ensilage left over to use in the summer seems to be in favor of the ensilage, says American Cultivator There is no crop that will give as much value in succulent fodder as the corn crop. Nearly every one concedes that to be true. But the time when a supplementary feed is needed because of the failure of pastures may vary from May until October. We can remember se vere droughts and a short supply of pasture feed in each one of those six months and in some years for two or three months in succession

The soiling crops, useful as they are. cannot always be so planned as to give needed, it can be kept almost indefinitely. We have read of those who said it was as good after keeping three years as the next season after putting in, and if it will keep three years we see no reason why it should not be good after six years.

We do not wish to discourage any farmer or dairyman from growing green crops to feed in the summer, but we wish every one who has a silo for winter feeding would also provide another that would hold two or three months' supply for use in the summer.

Sile Too Large. A correspondent writes as follows to Hoard's Dairyman: "I erected a silo 14 feet in diameter by 20 feet high for about 16 head of stock. Now I find that my silo is rather large for my present amount of stock to feed two inches of surface each day. Can I with safety feed from one-half of the sur-

face every other day?" In answer The Dairyman says: "It is advisable in such cases to cover one-Saturday, the 8th of March, 1902, half of the sile by means of boards or tarpaulin so as to keep the heat in and prevent molding. If this is done, there is no difficulty in feeding from alter-



A Substitute For Leather.

It is reported from Coburg by Consul General Hughes that a Frenchman has invented a process by which refuse skins and hides are converted into an artificial leather called "fibroleum." He takes the waste scraps from all sources and cuts them into very small pieces. These are put into a vat containing an intensely alkaline solution. After the mass has become pulpy it is taken out and passed through a specially constructed machine.

A Smokeless Flashlight. A French scientific investigator believes he has discovered a flashlight powder compound which is practically smokeless. The principle is to keep the magnesia that is formed when magneslum powder is exploded as much as ossible attached to a heavy substance that will not easily fly about and which soon falls of its own weight. A substance suitable for this purpose is found in the binoxide of barium.

Cerusine is a new product of M. Lepine intended as a substitute of oil paint. It is a mixture of animal give and white lead, with the addition of a varying proportion of borax and a small quantity of potash or nitric acid. The usual pigments are added for the various colors.

Chimes Rung by Air. The chimes of St. Patrick's cathedral, New York city, are now rung by compressed air, the bells being actuated through the medium of electrical de-



A new method of heating cars has been adopted in Christiania and Stockholm. The apparatus consists of long perforated boxes, one under each length of seats. The boxes are filled with redhot briquettes of compressed coal prepared so that no smoke or smell results from their consumption. Iron sheeting is arranged under the seats, which allows the fumes to escape to the open

On fresh air passing through a ventilator placed under the coalbox at the bottom of the car the bot, combustible gases pass through this iron sheeting throughout its entire length, diffusing a steady heat into the car through a set of perforated iron plates placed between the legs of the seats.
