Lewisville, Or. From the County Roadmaster.

Editor Itemizer: In answer to your letter of inquirry as to what my poli-cy as roadmaster of this county will Henry Z. be, I will say this: The main thing I shall insist on is for each supervisor to pay, first of all, strict attention to a district. When that is dene one half in several conversions. of the battle is wen. It must also be understood from the start that no slipshod job goes. I have inspected about 150 miles of road within two weeks and on much the greater part of it I found either standing or running water. This is death to any kind of a road. The first and main object should be to get the side ditches at least 12 inches lower than the center of the road, and then see to it that they are kept there and free from obstructions. The next thing is to not do any extensive grading unless it can have a coat of rock or gravel. It grading at all, than to try to throw up off with some kind of material that will bear wagon travel. 


