United Evangelical Conference.

Thursday forenoon will occur the examination of junior preachers and in the afternoon a missionary program and business session of the conference missionary society. In the evening there will be the annual missionary meeting presided over by the society and a sermon by S. J. Lindsay, of Independence. Friday morning at 9 o'clock the conference proper will open with Bishop Stanford as chairman. After the bishop's address a communion service. In the evening will be the K. L. C. E. rally in charge of C. T. Hurd, of Lafayette, the sermon to be by H. A. Deck, of Portland. For the Sabbath and other services announcements will be made in next week's paper.
