Money savers in office are wanted by the overburdened taxpayers in this county, economy in public expenditures being of far more concern to them than the political belief of the candidate.

When W. A. Wann started on the educational campaign, the republicans laughed at the idea of his tackling Mr. Ackermann, and that gentleman considered the opposition as almost unworthy of notice.

Both the socialists and the prohibitionists seem to have a higher opinion of Mr. Chamberlain than of Mr. Furnish. They wish they could elect him while voting for most of the balance of their own ticket.

It is a notable fact that nearly all Oregon drummers will support Chamberlain for governor. Scores of them have been approached and they all assert loyalty to him, they finding in him many qualities worthy of admiration.

For years the people of Oregon are complaining that taxes were too high and burdensome and that there was a too lavish expenditure and waste of public money. The members of republican legislatures have repeatedly promised to curtail these abuses, but have continually managed to let them grow rather than diminish.

A prominent Josephine county republican says that he feels sure that his party lost votes by the coming of Furnish with his school boy speech.

Several prominent republicans who hate intemperance, said last week that if satisfied that Mr. Furnish visited the saloon while here they would not support him.

The general impression is that the democrats will carry Baker, Union, Umatilla and Wallows counties. It is said that fully one-third of the republicans in Union county will refuse to support their ticket because so much dissatisfied with the doings of the self appointed party bosses.

The other day the Oregonian began an editorial with this suggestive statement: "Oregon may go democratic in June and if it does the blame will rest upon the business men and the working men."

In Umatilla county there is a club of 400 anti-Furnish republicans. It includes two ex-state senators, two ex-representatives and four of the most prominent business men and farmers. It would seem that those who know the gentleman best, think least of him.

We clip the following from Tuesday's Statesman: "No matter what he thinks of Mr. Furnish, or who he thinks ought to be on the ticket in his place, no republican has any right to vote anything but the straight ticket this year."

Now is not that applying the party lash rather vigorously. Such is the order from the Furnish headquarters in Portland. Are there any republicans in Polk county who claim the right to call their souls and their minds their own.

George E. Chamberlain has proven himself a friend of the people and not a cold blooded money maker. He made an honorable public record and done many things for the benefit of his constituents, and during his many years of official life never grasped after exorbitant fees.

It is claimed that in Umatilla over 500 republicans, including many of the most prominent men in all the walks of life, will not support Mr. Furnish because of his well known record and unworthy means used to secure his nomination.

Such a hornets nest has been aroused between the two republican factions in Portland that present reconciliation is not possible. Judge Williams does nearly all the speaking for the Oregonian crowd, while the others come out boldly as to what they are doing and will do.

That the next legislature will be republican there is no doubt; that the past ones have given popular satisfaction is utterly untrue. They have always made big promises of reform and invariably fallen considerably short of the mark.

We always have advocated and always will advise voting for the best man put up for any office of trust and importance, and conservative men of all parties agree upon that being the proper thing.

Hon. N. L. Butler made his first and only campaign speech at Buell last evening, and from the records gave evident reasons why there should be more democrats in the legislature to help keep down the outrageously lavish expenditure of the people's money.

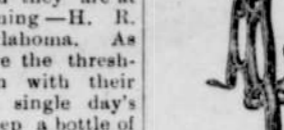
