The republicans have quit harping on what a grand business governor Mr. Furnish would make. That he is a swift money maker no one will deny, but when he was sheriff and when he was marshal immense personal profits dropped in his own coffers. Neither he nor his friends have ever denied damaging charges made against him in those connections. In one case he charged the county at the rate of 180 per cent interest. It has been repeatedly stated and never denied that he charged the county \$1,200 for printing a delinquent tax list and settled with the poor printer for \$249. The records show that in four years he drew \$48,000 as fees from the county, everything that he touched turning into big profits for himself. Would he not be likely to keep up the same habit as governor and to wink at the sharp practice perpetrated on the state by others. Mr. Chamberlain's past record proves that he would do otherwise.
