Governor Penney Dead. In 1856 at the age of 24 years he came from New York to Portland and was admitted to the bar, but never practiced law. He taught school for a few years, but in 1862 changed to the lumber business at which he was very prosperous for many years. In 1886 he was elected governor, and served for eight years, no other governor having held that office so long. He was mayor of Portland for two years, beginning in 1896. He had positive convictions on all important questions and fearlessly expressed and carried them out, no matter who opposed. He was in some respects eccentric and while governor did several things that gave him a worldwide notoriety. As a citizen, business man and public official his life was pure and stainless. He died suddenly last Friday in Portland at the home where he had lived for so long. No man in the city had more warm friends.
