Always have the water lukewarm for the reason that a large number of our house plants come from the tropics. Give them a very generous soaking, not all at once, but wait five minutes between waterings, and you will be surprised to see how much some of the plants will take up. I always water twice and sometimes

thrice until the saucers are full, then give them a grand rest for three or four days until the surface earth is dry to touch.

Try to keep the temperature as even as possible, about 70 degrees during the day and not lower than 50 or 60 degrees at night.

The treatment generally recommended is to cut off the knots and burn them, which is a good thing to do if it is done before the winter spores have been distributed. If not, then some additional treatment will be necessary. It is recommended, therefore, that all knots be cut off and burned, and, in addition to this, spray the trees with a strong solution of bordeaux mixture during the first warm days of spring. 


