It is a fact also, he says, that at least 200,000 cows of the dairy berds of the state are absolutely worthless. That the business is not being overdone, he points out, is shown by the fact that in 1850 the United States had seventy cows to every 1,000 inhabitants, while in 1900 the average number of cows for every 1,000 people was but fifty-seven.

I have seen cows that would not go dry even with this kind of treatment. If they will not, the only thing to do is to milk them continuously and feed and care for them accordingly.

A Color Test.

The internal revenue department has asued a circular letter of instructions giving tests by which coloring matter may be detected in oleomargarine. Fuller's earth is prescribed as the test for yellow dyes, which are used ex-tensively in coloring oleomargarine and butter. A pinch of the earth h placed on a saucer and covered with sample of the melted olco. The presence of any of the aniline dyes will be shown by the mixture turning a rose color. If the oleomargarine has not been artificially colored, the mixture will remain the color of the fuller's earth. For a cottonseed test the butter or olecmargarine is melted and an ounce of benzine is added. If cottonseed oil has been used, a white residue settles to the bottom. The department agrees to analyze any samples sent to Washington and to report upon them.



#### THOROUGH CULTIVATION.

Its Aims and Results In Irrigation Practice In Dry Summer Regions. The prevailing motive for cultivation In the dry summer region of the Pacif te coast is moisture retention. In this respect good surface tilth is so effec-I ve that, though enough moisture can not be retained without it, so much can be retained with it that even where irrigation or rainfall is moderate in amount it may serve all purposes of the tree or vine. Thus cultivation enters into the fruit growers' practice in the region under consideration not to make large rainfall effective, as it cloes in some parts of the Pacific coast region, but to make moderate rainfall effective or to make small irrigation elective by increasing the duty of waonly a ruling consideration in the efwas otherwise detrimental to the thrift of trees.

Thorough cultivation both in winter and summer has other very important ends in view. It opens the soil and promotes neration; it encourages deeper rooting and thus encourages the tree to take possession of a greater soil mass both for moisture and other plant food. It is part of a very valuable policy of increasing humus by plowing under the natural growth of eeds or special's -- wn legumes. This increases the arun, t of organic matter in the soil, . at a new plant food, promotes the fros ity of heavy soils and the retentivence of light soils and is otherwise valuable.

Green manuring in some parts of the region is done by plowing in winter growths in the spring. In the localistitute for cultivation, cutting the crop without removing it, but allowing it to disintegrate in place, is held by some growers to be additional protection to creased eating as a means of keeping its supply of plant food.-E. 
