SUGAR BEET SEEDING.

An Accidental Autumn Development of Great Possible Value.

The Michigan station reports an accidental development in sugar beet grow It is of special interest because it may lead to a new and improved method of procedure and therefore rove of great value to sugar beet farmers. A test of it would be in order this fall.

In the year 1900 a few sugar beet seed were grown at the station, with view to studying the question of home production of seed. This experiment met with fair success, a small crop of seed being produced that year and the same planted in the spring of 1901. 
