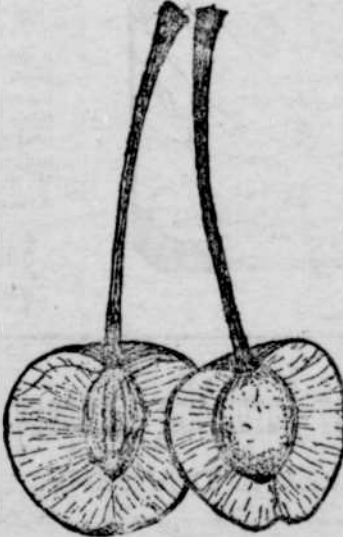

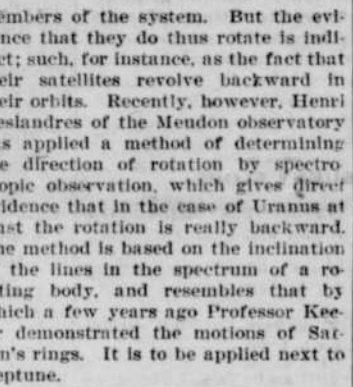

James A. Murphy has purchased Dusty Wilkes, 2:15, from M. D. Avery of Toledo, O.

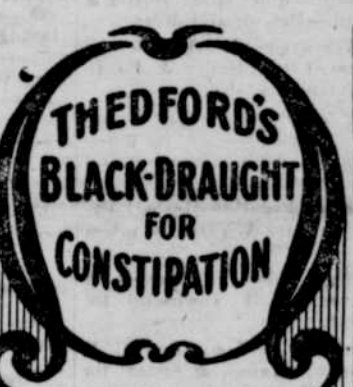
The pacing gelding Henry Titer, by Emperor Wilkes, won ten out of eleven races on the Maine tracks this season.
