H. S. Portwood was made guardian of Elva Portwood under \$5000 bond, which was filed and approved.

The report of sale of real property in the matter of the Richard Eves estate was filed and approved.

C. M. Purvine asked to be made executor of the C. C. Walker estate.

Otis Wolverson was appointed executor of the John Wolverson estate and F. S. Powell, G. T. Boothby and Monroe Mulkey are to appraise the property.

COMMISSIONERS.

An application having been made to establish what is known as the Lady county road, T. B. Stone, John Quirk and N. M. Dickey were appointed viewers to meet County Surveyor Ground January 21st to view and survey said proposed road.

The bond of F. E. Myer as assessor was presented and approved.

A number of tax certificates held by the county were ordered cancelled because of erroneous assessments.

The tax levy was fixed at 26 mills, the same as last year. The state tax is 19 1/4 mills, school 5, road 14, and school book fund 110 mill. Mr. Riggs dissenting from the last named.

The county treasurer was credited with \$28,806 cancelled warrants.

H. A. Baldwin was granted a five years ferry license at Buena Vista at \$1 a year, but to give a \$500 bond. The rates of ferriage are not to exceed 35 cents for double team, 25 cents for single, single rig or saddle horse and 10 cents for loose cattle or horses.
